The Vacancy of 1455-56¹

Edmund Lacy died on 18 September 1455.² He was in his early eighties and had served as bishop of Exeter for 35 years.³ Until a new bishop was chosen, responsibility for ecclesiastical government in Devon and Cornwall (and the revenues that accrued from its exercise) fell to the archbishop of Canterbury, Thomas Bourghier, who on 26 September appointed three experienced local clerics to serve as his deputies or keepers of the spiritualities: Henry Webber, Roger Keys and John Udy. William Elyot was to be their scribe and registrar.⁴

At the same time the crown was taking charge of the see's estates or temporalities. On 21 October these were put out to farm to a group of senior cathedral clergy⁵ headed by John Cobethorn the dean⁶ for whom two local laymen stood surety.⁷ The clerics agreed to pay the crown £800 a year although this was not finally settled until the following 13 February by which time George Neville had been provided to the diocese.⁸ On 21 March the king's escheators were ordered to deliver the temporalities to the new bishop and on 10 April the spiritualities were also released to him.⁹ The vacancy was over.

The *acta* of the Exeter *sede vacante* are recorded in Archbishop Bourghier's register.¹⁰ There is no account of the moneys received from the granting of institutions, ordinations and licences.¹¹ Nor is there any evidence that Webber and his colleagues attempted to hold a visitation of the diocese as their powers entitled them to do and as other keepers of spiritualities frequently did.¹² This may be because of a lack of time or because political circumstances dictated against it.¹³

Bourgchier's register has been edited by the Canterbury and York Society¹⁴ but I have gone back to the original manuscript to correct, simplify and rearrange several of the entries. Some additions have been made.¹⁵

George Neville's election as bishop of Exeter

Lacy died at a time of great political turbulence. Henry VI's weak and divisive rule had brought the country to the brink of civil war. In the autumn of 1455 the south west became the focal point for this gathering storm as Thomas Courtenay earl of Devon sought to rid himself of his long-term political rival Sir William Bonville. Although this was a private enmity the violent and unrestrained manner in which Courtenay went about his work helped determine local attitudes towards the houses of York and Lancaster.

The earl was an embittered and isolated man.¹⁶ He had suffered a long minority following his father's death in 1422 during which his family's status as power-brokers in Devon and Cornwall had been undermined by the upstart Bonville. At first Courtenay turned to the Yorkist party for help. But this proved unrewarding because Bonville enjoyed ties with the duke of York's close allies the Neville family headed by the earls of Salisbury and Warwick. Courtenay therefore fought on the king's side at the first battle of St Albans in May 1455 and soon afterwards retired with his three sons to his stronghold at Tiverton castle to plot his next move.

Money was the key to his plans. The earl was sustaining himself by pillaging the surrounding countryside but on 23 October his circumstances changed dramatically when his sons savagely and treacherously murdered Nicholas Radford a prominent local lawyer and former Courtenay supporter who had recently joined the Bonville camp. Radford was a man of considerable wealth and this seems to have been the chief reason for the plundering of his estate following his death. The booty the earl thus acquired enabled him to assemble a substantial military force the aim of which was to draw Bonville into battle. On 1 November Courtenay used his troops to seize control of Exeter which now became his base of operations and then moved his men down the west bank of the Exe to begin a six week-long siege of Powderham castle the home of his relative Sir Philip Courtenay¹⁷ with whom he was also at odds.

The earl probably anticipated that Sir Philip would appeal to Bonville for help. In early December the latter set out from his home at Shute in east Devon with a relieving force hoping to reach Powderham by way of his estates at Topsham. Courtenay's men intercepted him at Clyst Heath just to the east of the city on 15 December where a skirmish took place. Bonville's army was put to flight and he himself sought safety in Exeter. Later the same day Courtenay returned to the city in triumph and stayed there until 21 December when he and his followers retired to Tiverton.

By now the government in London was stirring itself. Reports of the earl's 'great and grievous riots' had reached parliament on 17 November and two days later York was appointed protector of the realm for the second time in 18 months following the king's relapse into madness. Belatedly on 13 December the duke was despatched to the south-west to quell the disturbances and shortly before Christmas Courtenay surrendered to him. The earl was rushed off to prison to await a treason trial in the New Year. Fortunately for him Henry VI regained his wits and power at the end of February enabling Courtenay to abandon the Yorkists, declare his loyalty to the king and obtain a pardon for himself and his sons for the murder of Radford and all other misdeeds. The treason trial was quietly forgotten and the earl's political rehabilitation was completed when his eldest son (also called Thomas) married into the royal family.

It was against this background of violence and disorder that the manoeuvrings leading to George Neville's election as bishop of Exeter took place. Neville was not in fact the first choice to succeed Lacy; that was John Hals (or Hales). And the Exeter dean and chapter in all probability held two elections¹⁸ although their dates and proceedings have not survived. What we do know is that the royal licence authorising the chapter to elect a successor to Lacy was issued on 8 October and that Hals was provided to the see by the pope on 20 October.¹⁹

In many respects he was an ideal choice: a local man, born at Kingsbridge, the son of a justice of the King's Bench, whose late brother Richard had served as cathedral treasurer under Bishop Stafford. Hals was also academically well-qualified being a former fellow of Exeter College Oxford, provost of Oriel College and a doctor of theology. Probably in his fifties at the time of his election, he was a long-standing prebendary of the cathedral, archdeacon of Norfolk and enjoyed the steadfast support of Queen Margaret whose chaplain he was.²⁰

But the king's relapse turned Hals into a partisan candidate. On 6 November George Neville was granted 'by the advice of the [royal] council' (in practice the Yorkist faction) a prebend in the cathedral which had fallen vacant. This was bad

news for Hals because earlier in April 1454 when the Yorkists were previously in power Neville had been promised the next vacant bishopric on account of his 'blood, virtue and cunning'.²¹ Evidently Neville had decided to target Exeter.

Hals's election probably took place in November. Once the royal licence had been received time would have been needed for the senior cathedral clergy to meet to decide on a date for the election and then formally summon their fellow prebendaries to attend.²² Whether the election was held before or after the cathedral became the focus for Courtenay's avarice is unclear but on 11 November the earl's men 'armed with swords and crossbows' seized the precentor, Henry Webber, and extorted money from him for his release. Next day the same men dragged Prebendary John Morton from the cathedral choir where he was celebrating divine service and also held him captive until he paid a fine of 10 marks together with a horse called a 'Hoby' and agreed an obligation of £40.²³ Other prebendaries were similarly 'put in finance' by Courtenay according to the report of the 'great and grievous riots' made to parliament.

Then on 20 November the earl demanded the goods and chattels that Radford had given in trust to John Cobethorn the dean and Roger Keys archdeacon of Barnstaple which were stored in the cathedral. Threatening to break down the cathedral doors and take whatever he found within including the possessions of the prebendaries Cobethorn and Keys gave way 'to avoid a greater evil' allowing the earl's men to enter and 'feloniously take and carry away' a large number of silver cups and vessels which with other goods and chattels were worth £600 as well as £700 in cash belonging to Radford.

York's arrival in the south-west just before Christmas must have been greeted with relief in the cathedral close especially as it was quickly followed by Courtenay's surrender and arrest. And it evidently strengthened the hand of Neville who now moved from being a peripheral figure to a key player. Seizing the window of opportunity that the king's incapacity had given them the Yorkists very likely applied pressure to Hals to resign and early in the New Year another election was held. On 4 February the pope, who was responding to events, provided Neville to the see in Hals' place so that by the time Henry VI regained control of government it was too late for him or anyone else to overturn what had happened.²⁴ As we have seen the temporalities and spiritualities of the see were speedily granted to Neville and normal diocesan life resumed.²⁵

George Neville as bishop of Exeter

Neville was only 24 when he became bishop but he was already a churchman of a dozen years' standing.²⁶ Papal dispensations combined with membership of one of the leading noble families of the realm had enabled him to become archdeacon of Durham and Northampton and prebendary of five cathedrals by the time of his election.

His father was Richard Neville earl of Salisbury whilst his eldest brother also called Richard was earl of Warwick 'the Kingmaker'. Both were men of action who died violent deaths in rebellion against the crown and whilst George managed to avoid this fate the later stages of his rule as Archbishop of York were overshadowed by a bitter enmity between himself and the king, Edward IV, which led to his imprisonment on a charge of treason. Eventually released and pardoned Neville was nonetheless a dispirited and sick man and shortly afterwards in 1476 he died at the relatively young age of 43.

Neville is often cast as an aristocratic *bon viveur* spending and dining lavishly whenever he pleased. But he also had a solid academic pedigree as a graduate of Balliol College Oxford who supplicated for the degree of doctor of theology and who engaged Bishop Reginald Pecock in learned debate about the christian fathers. He also served as university chancellor in the mid 1450s reviving the study of Greek, promoting scholarship and financing building projects. Books were dedicated to him and he is credited with saving Lincoln College from dissolution in 1462. Nonetheless Neville did lack important skills needed for episcopal office. He had no experience of pastoral work and no legal expertise with which to govern his diocese.

No doubt these shortcomings were in the mind of Pope Calixtus III when he provided Neville to Exeter in February 1456 because he imposed an important stipulation that the new bishop was not to be consecrated until he reached his 27th year.²⁷ Neville was thus a prelate in name only for the first two years of his episcopate and very dependent on his local deputies chief among whom was Webber who became his vicar-general.²⁸

Webber's appointment and that of other key personnel are recorded in Neville's register. John Udy became president of the consistory court and official peculiar and sequestrator-general in Devon, John Nycoll official peculiar and sequestrator-general in Cornwall and Roderick Barrett suffragan bishop.²⁹ Neville journeyed to Exeter to make Barrett's appointment in May 1456 but it seems likely that otherwise he stayed at Balliol College where he had a house³⁰ at least until his term as chancellor ended the following year and probably for a while afterwards. Not until the very end of 1458 was he able to be consecrated and take up the reins of episcopal government for himself.³¹

Neville arrived in his diocese in the early spring of 1459 and stayed there for the remainder of the year.³² His register shows that he did not confine himself to Exeter and the nearby manor of Bishop's Clyst. During the summer months he toured Devon stopping at Cullompton, Crediton, Great Torrington, Tavistock Abbey and Bishop's Tawton. This was probably a formal visitation of his see although Neville does not seem to have ventured into Cornwall which he most likely left to his deputies.³³ The bishop also held ordination ceremonies in Crediton collegiate church and Exeter Cathedral whilst throughout his stay in the south-west he regularly admitted clerics to livings taking over the burden of this work from Webber.

Neville was back at Exeter in early autumn in time to receive a royal summons to attend parliament which was scheduled to meet at Coventry on 20 November.³⁴ This was a turning point for the bishop because he now became enmeshed in the high politics of the period. A foretaste came in mid October when his father, eldest brother and the earl of March the future Edward IV fled into Devon following the 'rout of Ludford', an abortive attempt by the Yorkists to seize power.³⁵ Guided by John Dinham a Yorkist sympathiser, Salisbury and his co-conspirators went into hiding at Nutwell the home of Dinham's mother near Woodbury just south of Exeter whilst Dinham made efforts to acquire a boat to take them to Calais which was a centre of opposition to Henry VI's regime. In late October the refugees set sail from Exmouth and it is difficult not to imagine that the bishop either met or in some other way secretly helped them before their departure.

Neville left his diocese in early November.³⁶ At Coventry he witnessed the retribution that the Lancastrians meted out to their opponents. York, March,

Salisbury, Warwick and two of the bishop's other brothers were attainted for treason and their lands confiscated. But Neville himself was unscathed; indeed the king commended him for his loyalty. Neville remained at Coventry until 15 December when he admitted John Cody to Ilfracombe rectory.³⁷ Two days later he was at Oxford commissioning Thomas Chippenham one of the Exeter canons residentiaries and Roger Keys archdeacon of Barnstaple to confirm the election of a new dean of the cathedral following John Hals' resignation.³⁸

At some point in early 1460 Neville moved to Exeter Place, the bishop of Exeter's London residence, presumably to be closer to events in this febrile year. In June with other prelates he received the oaths of loyalty to Henry VI of Salisbury, Warwick and March at Southwark after they had returned to England in a further bid to gain control of royal government. He then accompanied the earls to Northampton to mediate with the king on their behalf. The following month after Henry's capture by the Yorkists, Neville was appointed Lord Chancellor a post he was to hold until 1467. In 1461 he helped elect Edward as king and then preached in support of March's claim to the throne gaining the backing of the papal legate for the new regime. He also preached the sermons that opened the first and second parliaments of Edward's reign.

Although Neville's work as chancellor tied him to the capital he still found time to make an occasional visit to his diocese. In October 1460 he issued letters at Exeter dismissing the complaint that the inhabitants of Cury chapelry near Helston had brought against the monks of Hailes Abbey whilst in February 1465, again at Exeter, he authorised the pension that Plympton Priory had granted to a former prior. At the end of the following month he held an ordination ceremony in St Mary Major Church opposite the cathedral.³⁹

Although Neville's visits to the south-west were few in number it should not be concluded that he entirely neglected diocesan affairs. The records show that whilst residing in London, Oxford and at Moor Park Rickmansworth⁴⁰ he admitted clerics to livings, issued warrants to the royal chancery to enable long-standing excommunicates to be arrested and oversaw the taxation of his clergy.⁴¹ It is likely that members of his administration and registry journeyed back and forth to the capital to maintain his links with his see and provide the support that a bishop *in remotis* needed.

Like many in the Yorkist regime Neville was a northerner but there is no evidence to suggest that he had a plan to reform his diocese by bringing in outsiders to run

his administration.⁴² He seems to have been content to work with Webber with whom he established close ties. In 1461 the two men made a joint loan of £1000 to Edward IV who repaid it by granting them £820 from the revenues of the duchy of Cornwall and the coinage of tin in Cornwall and Devon and £180 from the clerical tenth that was being collected in the diocese.⁴³ Neville was empowered to issue further letters patent if the grant proved insufficient. Edward had earlier given his chancellor the customs duties from 350 sacks of wool shipped through the ports of London, Southampton and Sandwich 'in consideration of the grievous costs and charges which the bishop has daily born with cheerful mind in the king's service'.⁴⁴

Neville also enjoyed a good working relationship with Archbishop Bourghier of Canterbury who was his cousin and another Yorkist episcopal appointee drawn from the ranks of the higher nobility. Both men sought to defend the liberties of the church against lay encroachment. When a royal charter limiting the scope of writs of prohibition failed to achieve its purpose the two prelates combined to lobby for parliamentary legislation. This led them to revive the moribund device of the charitable subsidy in a bid to gain the king's support.⁴⁵

Edward was desperately short of money in the early years of his reign and saw the church as a ready source of income. He was also aware of the inadequacy of the tenth, the main clerical tax of the later medieval period. The valuations used to levy the tax were almost two centuries old whilst many clergy escaped paying it because they did not hold benefices. Under Richard II and the Lancastrians flat rate or poll taxes had been employed to boost yield but had proved controversial. Reviving the charitable subsidy which had last been used in the mid fourteenth century offered a means of increasing revenues without producing the level of unrest and avoidance that had accompanied the poll taxes.

Unlike tenths charitable subsidies were both granted and administered by Convocation. Bourghier and Neville were thus able in 1463 to introduce a graduated tax for assistant clergy which recognised differences in wealth and ability to pay so that the fiscal burden was more equitably spread over the body of the clerical workforce. Neville's register contains the return for his diocese and shows a

cautious approach being adopted to the task of broadening the base of clerical taxation. Compared to later subsidies the number of contributors was relatively modest. Unfortunately for the two prelates this attempt at a *quid pro quo* with the crown was unsuccessful. The king received a new source of income but the church failed to get its legislation.

Neville was provided to York on 15 March 1465 and received the temporalities of his new see on 17 June.⁴⁶ His association with Exeter was over. By now relations between Edward and the Neville family had deteriorated following the king's marriage to Elizabeth Woodville in 1464 and the introduction of members of her family into royal government. In 1467 George was removed from the chancellorship and two years later he became a major player in the rebellion that led to the temporary overthrow of Edward and the short-lived return of Henry VI. Following the death of his brother Warwick in 1471 the bishop rather lost his way in politics and was involved in plots against Edward which led to his imprisonment and demise.

This was an unsatisfactory end to what might well have been a more successful and substantial career. Neville's powerful connections had aided him initially but had then prevented him from becoming an administrator bishop in the mould of his predecessors at Exeter.

George Neville's Register

Neville's register measures 14¼" x 10½" and is bound in buckram-covered boards with a hide-covered spine on which the number 12 is indented.⁴⁷ It is a fair copy parchment book which was probably compiled from rough drafts or original documents by a team of scribes. It is 155 folios long but not all the folios have survived.⁴⁸ The register has been affected by damp especially along its edges and this is most evident at the beginning and end of the volume where parts of the text have been lost or become illegible.

In common with later medieval practice, the register has a composite form with sections (which were themselves called registers) devoted to institutions, common acts, inquisitions and ordinations. These were maintained separately during Neville's tenure of office and brought together at the end of his episcopate. Each comprises a series of parchment quires which were probably kept loose until they were assembled to form a book.⁴⁹ The hard covers and spine we have today were added in 1925 when Prebendary J F Chanter was honorary diocesan archivist.⁵⁰

The register has a contemporary foliation in roman numerals covering the institutions, common acts and inquisitions sections.⁵¹ This was probably added when it was assembled and was no doubt overseen by the registrar, William Elyot, who is known to have taken a hand in the creation and maintenance of Lacy and

Neville's registers.⁵² There is also a modern foliation in arabic and roman numerals the latter of which extends into the ordinations section. This is probably the work of Ethel Lega-Weekes, a colleague of Chanter, who also annotated many of the folios of the institutions register in an attempt to combat the fading and decay caused by the damp.⁵³

When new Neville's register contained 156 folios.⁵⁴ Today the number is 149.⁵⁵ The losses are not especially serious. Folios 30-31 and 114-117 were probably cut out during one of the re-bindings and were very likely the unused portions of the final quires of the institutions and inquisitions sections.⁵⁶ A folio at the end of the latter section which contained the concluding part of Martin Dyer's will is also missing. This was probably the original folio 142 that was lost between 1641 and the 1920s.⁵⁷ Folio 142 was the start of a new quire and may therefore have been a single folio or bifolio. Sitting at the bottom of the inquisitions section it would have been particularly prone to damage and decay.

Altogether Neville's register probably had 21 quires although the tightness of the modern binding makes it difficult to be certain.

The quires are generally but not consistently 8 folios long. Most can be identified in one of two ways: by roman numerals (+ in the table) added at the top right hand corner of the first folio of the quires or by catchwords (# in the table above) added at the bottom of the versos of the end folios.⁵⁹

At least two scribes were responsible for the register. Scribe 1 who may have been a copyist under Lacy seems to have done the majority of the work whilst scribe 2 who was perhaps an assistant or apprentice provided occasional contributions in his distinctive handwriting.⁶⁰

Sadly the scribes' labours have not resulted in a register comparable to those of Neville's predecessors. This is because they or their masters decided to abandon the central feature of those earlier volumes, the *registrum commune*, which contained a welter of licences, dispensations, letters dimissory, mandates, processes and correspondence and replace it with a more modest section devoted to inquisitions into vacancies of livings.

This change occurred two years into Neville's episcopate. At first the scribes were content to copy the format of Lacy's common register. But in June 1458 they stopped and seemingly put the manuscript to one side for over three years. The next entry (which follows immediately) is dated September 1461 and begins a sequence devoted to clerical taxation, a subject close to Neville's heart. With the exception of four miscellaneous *acta* at the end, this concludes the *registrum commune* and so seven years of licences and allied material have been lost.

The same fate was inflicted upon the registers of Bishops Bothe, Courtenay, Fox, King and Redmayne and is accompanied by a general decline in appearance,

completeness and legibility. An attempt was made to reverse the process under Arundell, Oldham and Veysey but it was only short-lived as the administrative upheavals of the mid sixteenth century introduced an entirely new system of registration at Exeter.⁶¹

The merit of the inquisitions section is that it groups together entries that would otherwise have been dispersed throughout the *registrum commune*. There are 52 records of inquiries, 51 of which are arranged chronologically over the span of the episcopate.⁶² The stray⁶³ occurs towards the end of the section amongst 16 other *acta* concerned with elections (chiefly of monastic heads) and wills (of cathedral clergy).⁶⁴ These are entered out of order and may well have come to the scribes' attention after the inquisitions had been copied.

Two of the 16 *acta* have been added to the final quire of inquisitions⁶⁵, the last four folios of which were left blank. These *acta* are in the handwriting of the second scribe who was also responsible for the preceding quire. Three new quires were then created by the first scribe for the remaining five elections and nine wills. This sequence gives the impression of an unfinished project⁶⁶ and indeed both the common acts and inquisitions sections lack Elyot's notarial imprimatur which suggests that either they were produced independently of him or were not yet in their final form.

Book-ending Neville's register are the institutions and ordinations sections. Stylistically and qualitatively they belong to Lacy's era and therefore require no special comment at this point. An analysis of their contents and of the other sections follows.

(a) Institutions

Three hundred and sixty eight admissions to livings are recorded in the sub-register including 18 that are duplicates. The chronology is good for much of the time (**33-339**) but goes awry twice towards the end (**340-364** and **386-391**). The first is largely due to the duplicated entries. The second results from copying those admissions that Neville made whilst in London. They were kept separately until news of his translation to York necessitated the finalising and closure of the

register. A handful of admissions at the end (392-395) were made after Neville's departure during the vacancy of the see.

As vicar-general Webber was responsible for the large majority of the admissions. These were mostly made at Exeter, probably in the cathedral, although a number took place at Webber's south Devon benefice of Ugborough.⁶⁷ Neville's main contribution came in 1459 when he visited his diocese and the register marks this with a specially headed section (137-163). The table below summarises the admissions by year and by cause. Eleven resignations resulted from exchanges by incumbents when two incumbents decided to swap their livings. Religious houses and collegiate colleges made 105 presentations, the Exeter dean and chapter 32, Courtenay and his arch-rival Bonville 26 before their deaths in 1460, Neville and the crown nine and 'others' (mostly members of the aristocracy and gentry) 196.⁶⁸ Three hundred and forty six of the presentees were admitted in person whilst 22 used a proctor or proxy. Thirty seven claimed to be⁶⁹ university degree holders.

The brevity of the entries in the register belies the complexity of the process of admission. There were in fact four stages: presentation, examination, institution (or collation) and induction.⁷⁰

Patrons as the owners of the advowson or right of presentation normally presented to vacant livings. But sometimes they granted their right to others for a period or a 'turn'.⁷¹ Those presenting had six months in which to do so after which the right fell by default or lapse to the bishop.⁷² Presentations were usually made in writing

and the entries in Neville's register frequently record the showing of patrons' letters at institution.

Advowsons were often attached to manors so that the lord of a manor would also be patron of the living or livings in which his estate was situated. Some manors were jointly owned and in these circumstances the owners took turns to present, the frequency of their turns being determined by the percentage of the manor that each held. When there was uncertainty about the identity of the patron the bishop would commission an inquiry into the vacancy. Rival patrons might also enter caveats or *cautiones* in the bishop's registry preventing the diocesan from admitting anyone until the matter had been resolved.⁷³

Disputes were heard in the court of King's Bench by writ of *quare impedit* because advowsons were regarded as property and therefore subject to the common law. During the course of the hearing a writ of *certiorari* might be sent to the bishop obliging him to search his predecessors' registers to identify those who had previously presented and by what right. Before the Reformation many disputes resulted from the crown's attempt to intrude its chaplains into local benefices. After the Reformation the number of disputes grew as the gentry replaced the monasteries as patrons and as the descent of manors became ever more complicated by marriages, minorities, grants and entails.

Once a dispute had been settled the court would order the bishop to admit the nominee of the successful party and any cleric who had been instituted too hastily beforehand would be automatically removed. The nominee, however, still had to show his diocesan that he was fit to serve the benefice. This meant that he had to be 25 years of age, of legitimate birth, of good character, free, learned and in priest's orders.

Although Neville's register has little to say about examinations and refusals it is evident that checks were carried out. Certainly we know that the credentials of at least 58 presentees were scrutinised by rural chapters as part of the process of inquiring into vacant livings whilst more generally the readiness of clerics to obtain dispensations for insufficiency of age, birth, learning and orders suggests that examination by a bishop or his deputies was not to be taken lightly. On the other side, the prospect of facing a writ of *quare impedit* from an aggrieved patron or a *duplex querela* action brought by an unsuccessful presentee may have deterred diocesans from rejecting candidates too readily.

Institutions and collations (where the bishop was also patron) involved the presentee or his proxy⁷⁴ taking an oath of canonical obedience to the diocesan. And if the cleric was being instituted to a vicarage he also took an oath of personal

residence.⁷⁵ After the Reformation presentees were also obliged to subscribe to the 39 articles of 1563 and the three articles of 1604 endorsing the royal supremacy and the validity of the book of common prayer and the 39 articles.⁷⁶

Letters testimonial were issued to presentees as evidence of their institution whilst 'a distinct and particular entry thereof [was] made in the public register of the ordinary: that is, not only that such a clerk received institution on such a day, and in such a year; but, if the clerk was presented, then at whose presentation, and whether in his own right, or in the right of another; and if collated, or presented by the crown, then whether in their own right or by lapse'. This is what my calendar of the entries in Neville's register attempts to provide.

Institution made the cleric responsible for the cure of souls of his parish and also allowed him to take possession of the glebe and tithes from the sequestrators who had held them during the vacancy of the benefice. But the new incumbent could not grant or sue for these items until he had been inducted. This was the job of the archdeacon in whose jurisdiction the living lay and to whom the bishop sent a mandate immediately following institution.⁷⁷ By inducting a cleric into a living the archdeacon gave him corporal possession of the church 'with all the rights, profits and appurtenances thereto belonging'. The formal ceremony involved handing the cleric the key of the church, opening the church door and leading or inducting him into the church. A bell was then rung to make the induction known to the parishioners and the archdeacon's mandate was endorsed as a certificate of the proceedings.

(b) Common Acts

As we have seen Neville's common register is effectively in two parts; the first is a continuation of Lacy's *registrum commune* covering the period to June 1458 whilst the second is a record of clerical taxation for the early 1460s.

The *registrum commune* section contains examples of the licences, dispensations and commissions that bishops and their vicars-general routinely issued. Popular licences were those granted to clerics and well-to-do members of the laity allowing them to celebrate divine service in places other than parish churches and chapelries.⁷⁸ Clergy sought dispensations to obtain holy orders in other dioceses⁷⁹ and to be absent from their livings.⁸⁰ Commissions were issued to sequester

benefices⁸¹ and to inquire into rights of patronage⁸² and the pollution of churches and cemeteries⁸³ whilst deputy penitentiaries were appointed to hear the confessions of laity and fellow clerics that were too serious or complex for parish priests to deal with. Chosen annually from among well-qualified and experienced local clergy they supported the work of the bishop's penitentiary-general in Exeter.⁸⁴ Each rural deanery had its own allocation of penitentiaries.⁸⁵

There were almost 700 parishes and dependent chapelries in the diocese at this time.⁸⁶ Most belonged to one of the 32 rural deaneries which together formed the archdeaconries of Exeter, Totnes, Barnstaple and Cornwall. Some 70 or more parishes and chapelries were outside this hierarchy because they were peculiars. Peculiars were parishes which had gained jurisdictional independence from the archdeaconries in which they were situated because they were part of manors owned by other exercisers of ecclesiastical authority. At Exeter the two main peculiar authorities were the dean and chapter and the bishop. The dean of Exeter and the vicars choral of the cathedral each also had parishes under their control⁸⁷ whilst in the far west of Cornwall the royal peculiar or deanery of St Buryan comprised St Buryan and its dependent chapelries of St Levan and Sennen.⁸⁸

Covering the counties of Devon and Cornwall Exeter was a large diocese which presented a challenge to those whose job it was to administer it.⁸⁹ Bishops of Exeter exercised authority through their officers: the official principal or chief judge of the consistory court, his deputy the president of the consistory, the officials peculiar of Devon and Cornwall, the four archdeacons and the 32 rural deans. A small army of registrars, scribes, lawyers and apparitors supported this hierarchy.

Bishops were the heads of their administrations. But when they were away from their sees vicars-general acted for them. Their powers were suitably wide-ranging allowing them to do most things that a bishop might do. Webber's commission is a good example going further than many because it also appoints him official principal and commissary-general.⁹⁰ This last role allowed Webber to preside over the bishop's audience or household court which dealt with serious breaches of canon law. Webber had done this job under Lacy when he also served as president of the

consistory.⁹¹ Neville's broad commission was thus a natural progression for him and foreshadowed the all-embracing office of episcopal chancellor of the post-Reformation period.

One thing that Webber could not do, however, was ordain men to the priesthood. This was a job reserved for bishops alone and so in Neville's absence suffragans had to be appointed. They were usually of two kinds: titular bishops of sees *in partibus infidelium* who were consecrated specifically to serve as suffragans and bishops of sees in the remoter parts of the British Isles who for various reasons were unable to reside in their dioceses.⁹² Their duties also required them to confirm boys, reconcile churches and cemeteries polluted by bloodshed and bless altars, chalices, vestments, bells and newly-elected heads of religious houses.⁹³

During the later middle ages church government became increasingly bureaucratic and legalistic following the arrival of notaries public and canon lawyers from the continent.⁹⁴ Registers of acts began to be kept and courts replaced synods as the medium through which bishops ruled their sees.⁹⁵ At Exeter the consistory became the chief tribunal for the diocese.⁹⁶ By the early fourteenth century it had a large complement of advocates and proctors and its own registry.⁹⁷ It met in St Edmund's chapel in the north-west corner of the cathedral⁹⁸ and largely dealt with civil suits being a court of first instance and appeal for Devon and Cornwall. John Polyng was registrar when Neville became bishop; he had held the office for over 25 years.⁹⁹

Neville's *registrum commune* records three commissions that he issued to John Udy and John Nycoll at the start of his episcopate.¹⁰⁰ Udy became president of the consistory and official peculiar and sequestrator-general for Devon whilst Nycoll was appointed official peculiar and sequestrator-general for Cornwall. Udy, like Webber, was an experienced hand. He had shadowed Webber as president during Lacy's rule¹⁰¹ and so was the ideal choice to succeed Webber when the latter was promoted to official principal. As president Udy adjudicated on the routine cases of the consistory leaving Webber free to attend to his other duties.

Udy had also served as official peculiar in Devon under Lacy.¹⁰² Neville's commissions gave him and Nycoll cognizance over criminal and civil causes in Devon and Cornwall including the crimes of adultery and incest. They were also to prove the wills of beneficed clergy in both counties and the wills of the laity in the peculiars. And as sequestrators-general they oversaw the collection and distribution of the revenues arising from vacant and sequestered livings.

The officials peculiar bridged the gap between centre and periphery of the diocese.¹⁰³ They had begun life as administrators of the episcopal peculiars which were dispersed throughout Devon and Cornwall¹⁰⁴ and first appear in the early years of the fourteenth century.¹⁰⁵ Their powers at this time are ill-defined but by the middle of the following century they had reached their fullest extent and were equipped with their own seals.¹⁰⁶ It is likely that the officials focused on criminal cases and the proving of wills which were popular and profitable activities.

Few records survive for the church courts of the south-west before the sixteenth century and therefore much of this discussion relies on evidence taken from later periods. But it seems likely that the tribunals of the archdeacons were badly hit by the activities of the officials peculiar. The archdeacons also had cognizance over civil and criminal cases and so there was bound to be competition for business. Over time it was the archdeaconry courts that lost out and this was especially so in Devon where the nearness of the consistory stunted their growth and turned them into satellites of that tribunal.

The same men often served as officials peculiar and officials of the archdeacons. Udy, for example, was official of the archdeacon of Totnes in the 1450s.¹⁰⁷ Similarly proctors of the consistory probably also worked in the archdeaconry courts either as lawyers or registrars.¹⁰⁸ In Cornwall things may have been a little better because the county was farther from Exeter which enabled a stronger jurisdiction to develop with its own set of officials, proctors and staff.¹⁰⁹ But even here things cannot have been flourishing and all four archdeacons came to rely on their income from annual visitations and granting probate. The absence of judicial records may be partly due to the fact that there were few records to survive in the first place.

Complaisance rather than resistance is probably the best way to describe the archdeacons' reaction to the strengthening of episcopal government at Exeter in the later middle ages. Certainly there are no signs of the sort of conflict that we find elsewhere in England where struggles for power between bishops and their subordinates resulted in compositions or agreements defining the jurisdictional boundaries of the parties.¹¹⁰ At Exeter we have to wait until the early seventeenth century for the first composition which was promoted by the archdeacons and other lesser ordinaries in order to frustrate the rebuilding of episcopal government in the aftermath of the Reformation.¹¹¹ But the archdeacons' attempt to rein in their masters failed and they remained the episcopal agents that they had become in the later middle ages.¹¹²

The same malaise also affected the rural deans. In earlier times they may have exercised judicial powers through their chapters or gatherings of the clergy of their deaneries.¹¹³ But by Neville's time they had been reduced to the status of messengers executing mandates and citations¹¹⁴ whilst their chapters were taken over by the officials of the bishop and archdeacons and turned into forums for inquiring into dilapidations and rights of patronage.¹¹⁵

Rural deans were elected every Michaelmas by the clergy of the deaneries. 'Elected' is something of a misnomer because the choice was determined more by the benefice that the individual held than by the ability or character of the individual. A rota of livings seems to have existed which made the outcome of elections predictable. By the end of the sixteenth century apparitors had largely taken over the deans' work. Elections were still held and the names of the elected entered in the consistory court act books each year but the deans no longer appeared at Exeter to swear an oath of allegiance to the bishop and pay their fees for admission into office. This was now done on their behalf by the apparitors of the court who then carried out the tasks that the rural deans were supposed to do themselves.

Canterbury Convocation met three times during Neville's episcopate: in 1460-61, 1462 and 1463. On each occasion it granted the crown a clerical tenth payable in two equal instalments. In 1463 it also voted a charitable subsidy payable in a single contribution.

Tenths were levied on the annual value of benefices. Bishops were legally responsible for their collection but much of the work was done by deputies who were appointed from among the heads of local religious houses. They or their servants gathered the money and paid it over to the Exchequer.

At Exeter it was the practice to appoint different sub-collectors for each half tenth in each of the counties of Devon and Cornwall.¹¹⁹ They were chosen in response to royal mandates that were sent to diocesans following the granting of the tenths by Convocation. These recited the terms of the grants and ordered bishops to make arrangements for collecting the tax which included drawing up lists of exempt benefices. Diocesans were given a date by which they had to notify the Exchequer that they had carried out the crown's instructions. Schedules of exemptions and the names of the sub-collectors were included in their certificates.

Tenths are a difficult tax to understand because of the terminology that surrounds them. 'Taxed', 'untaxed', 'appropriated', 'unappropriated', 'accustomed to pay' and 'unaccustomed to pay' are key words and phrases in the documents copied into Neville's register. Collectively and individually they define and limit the number of benefices contributing to tenths.

The grants of the early 1460s aimed to tax all livings in the southern province except those that were exempt. 'All' in this context meant both 'taxed' and 'untaxed' benefices. 'Taxed' livings were benefices whose worth had been assessed in the 1291 *Taxatio*, a survey of the English Church compiled for Pope Nicholas IV.¹²⁰ The Exchequer used this to ensure compliance with the grants. 'Untaxed' benefices were livings that were unassessed because they did not exist in 1291. Many were former rectories turned into vicarages by the appropriation of their rectorial tithes to monastic houses.

'Untaxed' livings were 'unaccustomed to pay' tenths and therefore did not figure in the Exchequer's calculations unless, as in the early 1460s, some of their number were worth more than 12 marks annually. In the diocese of Exeter these were the four archdeaconries, the vicarages of Fremington, Barnstaple and Braunton and Woodbury church which was appropriated to the vicars choral of the cathedral. Their names were included in Neville's certificates so that the Exchequer would be aware of them when the sub-collectors came to hand over the money that they had gathered.

The Exchequer also needed to know about those 'taxed' benefices that were 'accustomed and unaccustomed to pay tenths' that claimed exemption from the tax. Over the course of the later middle ages exemptions to tenths had grown up and these occupy much of the verbiage of Convocation's grants and Neville's certificates. Inflation had eroded the valuations of 1291. Judged solely on the assessments of the *Taxatio* (as opposed to their real, current value) many livings now appeared too poor to pay tenths.

Exemptions were applied to individuals, ecclesiastical corporations and benefices. There are three categories in Neville's certificates: livings appropriated to impoverished monasteries, benefices worth no more than 12 marks annually that were unappropriated, taxed and accustomed to pay tenths and whose incumbents were resident and lastly livings that were taxed, unappropriated and unaccustomed to pay whose annual value was no more than 12 marks and whose incumbents were resident or who were licensed to study at universities in the realm. This last group was large and so their names were listed separately on schedules attached to the certificates. If these benefices were not reported to the Exchequer the crown would pursue their incumbents for payment of tenths because the names of their livings appeared in the *Taxatio*.

The schedule for the 1461 grant has been copied into Neville's register.¹²¹ But it and its accompanying certificate differ from the return that survives among the

clerical subsidy rolls in The National Archives.¹²² The certificate in The National Archives is dated 26 September 1461 and is issued from Moor Park Rickmansworth¹²³ whilst the copy in the register is dated 1 October and is issued from Exeter Place. The deputy collectors and their duties are also different. In the Exchequer certificate the prior of Launceston is responsible for collecting the first half of the tenth in Cornwall whilst the prior of St Nicholas and the abbot of Forde are assigned the first and second halves in Devon respectively. In the register the abbot of Hartland replaces the prior of Launceston whilst the prior of St Nicholas and the abbot of Forde swap places.

The biggest discrepancy is between the schedules of benefices exempted from paying the tenth because they were worth less than 12 marks annually. The return in the Exchequer has 121 livings 11 of which do not appear in the schedule in the register which has 222 benefices. The order of the livings also differs between schedules whilst a number of rural deaneries included in the copy in the register are omitted from the return in The National Archives.

Clearly we are looking at two separate documents which were submitted within a matter of days of each other. Why this should be so is unclear unless the first, the return in The National Archives, be thought to be incorrect or insufficient in some way. Neville and his staff were running close to the deadline for the submission of their certificate and it may be that a rushed preparation had led to mistakes or misunderstandings especially as Neville was many miles distant from his registry. Unfortunately no schedules have survived for the 1462 and 1463 tenths to enable the matter to be taken further.

The background to the 1463 charitable subsidy has already been outlined.¹²⁴ As the co-sponsor of this new tax Neville would have been eager to see it successfully implemented. But time was short. The date for payment was 8 September. Convocation had made its grant to Bourghier and Neville on 20 July. Bishops only received their orders from the archbishop at the beginning of August which left them with a mere five weeks in which to appoint collectors, compile schedules of contributors and send the money they had gathered to London. Neville's neighbour at Bath and Wells, Thomas Bekynton, certainly struggled to meet the deadline. His schedule includes the names of many clergy who had yet to pay 'on account of the shortness of time'.¹²⁵

There were also problems at Exeter which Webber was left to resolve. Here as elsewhere the task of collection was delegated to the archdeacons of the diocese. Neville commissioned them (or their officials) to act 'with all haste' on 3 August. They were given less than three weeks in which to report to the bishop with the names of the assessed and the amounts that each man had to pay. But there were

delays perhaps caused by resistance to the tax¹²⁶ and it was not until 31 August that Webber was able to send Bourgchier and Neville the necessary information. A schedule of contributors and contributions was attached to his letter and he also gave details of the exemptions claimed.

The charitable subsidy was levied on 'all unbeneficed chaplains both regular and secular, exempt and unexempt'.¹²⁷ There was a sliding scale of payment pitched at a rate of a tenth of earned incomes. Thus clerics receiving an annual stipend of £5 (or food and clothing and a stipend of four marks) were to pay 6s 8d, those receiving 10 marks were to pay 13s 4d whilst those receiving £10 were to pay 20s. Chaplains with pensions and those serving chantries, free chapels and hospitals were also to contribute.

Convocation exempted certain groups from the tax: the vicars choral of cathedrals and colleges, poor chaplains in Oxbridge Colleges, chaplains who had been accused of crimes but who had purged themselves before their bishops and those clerics who were decrepit and aged. At Exeter Webber's report specifically mentions the vicars choral and annuellars of the cathedral¹²⁸, the vicars of Crediton, Ottery St Mary, Glasney and Crantock Colleges, the master and brethren of St John the Baptist's Hospital, the priests of Clyst St Gabriel Hospital and the chaplain of Slapton College.

The names of 226 clergy appear in the schedule copied into Neville's register.¹²⁹ This is modest especially when it is remembered that there were almost 700 parishes and chapelries in the diocese and that every living probably had at least one assistant cleric helping (or substituting for) the incumbent. Correspondingly the yield of the subsidy was small at £102. In later years the number of contributors was significantly increased by expanding the categories of the unbeneficed and the rates of tax. In 1513 as many clergy were assessed in the archdeaconsry of Barnstaple as in the entire diocese half a century earlier.¹³⁰ Yield was 10 times higher in the archdeaconsry than in 1463. But this was in the future. Under Neville the subsidy was a limited experiment and it was left to others like Thomas Wolsey to develop its potential.

(c) Inquisitions

Again this is in two parts. The first contains certificates of inquisitions into rights of patronage, the second (which is itself subdivided) confirmations of elections of monastic heads and wills proved at Exeter before Webber.

Fifty-two inquisitions are recorded in this section whilst a further two are to be found in the institutions sub-register. With a couple of exceptions¹³¹ they concern the right of presentation to vacant livings. Bishops needed to ensure that presentees were not only personally suitable but also that they had been presented by those who were entitled to do so.¹³² Failure to take care could land the bishop in trouble with the common law courts which as we have seen took cognizance over matters involving advowsons. If the wrong man was admitted then the bishop might find himself stigmatized as a disturber of the true patron's rights. The *ius patronatus* inquiry was therefore as much concerned with protecting the diocesan's interests as it was with those of the presentee and patron.

The bishop or his vicar-general began the process of inquiry by issuing a commission to the official peculiar or archdeacon in whose jurisdiction the vacant living lay. These officers were charged with summoning the beneficed clergy of the deanery of the vacant living (or a sufficient number of them) to meet in chapter in one of the churches of the deanery, sometimes in the church of the vacant parish itself. The clergy were required to respond to a series of questions and once they had done so the presiding officer (usually the archdeacon's official) would draw up a certificate of proceedings and send it to Exeter. If the terms of the commission allowed it the officer would also institute the presentee who had been named in the commission assuming that the inquest had found nothing amiss.¹³³

The questions that the clergy had to answer were these: when did the living fall vacant; who is the true patron (or patrons); who last presented and by what right; is the benefice subject to litigation; what pensions, portions and taxes are payable from its revenues; is the presentee free, of legitimate birth, suitable and honest, in holy orders and does he hold other livings.

Burn's *Ecclesiastical Law* observes that the *ius patronatus* inquiry 'seems anciently to have been issued of course upon every presentation made, and antecedent to the admission and institution thereupon' and goes on to remark that 'now', in the mid eighteenth century, they 'were grown to be occasional only when churches happen to be litigious'.¹³⁴ Neville's register is something of a halfway house between these extremes. Allowing for the possibility of under-registration, it seems likely that inquiries were only convened when there was a suspicion that a dispute

over the right of presentation might arise. This would usually be when caveats or *cautiones* were entered by patrons (or alleged patrons) fearful that someone other than their candidate would be admitted by the bishop.

Caveats had no force at common law and so a diocesan could institute whomever he pleased. But it was a matter of 'equity and prudence' (according to Burn) that he first took stock of the situation by ordering a *ius patronatus* inquiry.¹³⁵ None of the inquests held during Neville's episcopate report litigation pending and only two mention a competing presentation. These involved Bickleigh rectory in east Devon where Humphrey Courtenay, the son of Sir Philip Courtenay of Powderham, had presented John Trewola to the living.

The inquisition which reported on 18 April 1465 found everything to be in order.¹³⁶ Courtenay was lord of the manor of Bickleigh to which the advowson belonged. But eight days later another inquiry ended. This was held because Humphrey's brother, Sir William Courtenay, had also made a presentation (presumably after Humphrey's) which required scrutiny. The name of William's candidate is not given and it is possible that both he and his brother had presented the same man (as sometimes happened). The clergy who attended the second gathering were rather dismissive of William's claim.¹³⁷ They repeated the findings of the first inquiry adding the comment that there was no litigation 'nor any controversy save the presentation of William Courtenay'.

Webber seems to have been waiting for their report because on the same day, 26 April, he instituted Trewola to the living.¹³⁸ William's claim evidently lacked substance and there is no evidence to suggest that he took matters further. If there were no other presentees it was relatively safe for the vicar-general to proceed. Certainly the affair has the appearance of an internal family dispute. Peter Courtenay, archdeacon of Exeter and the future bishop of Exeter who was another of Sir Philip's sons, personally (and for an archdeacon unusually) presided at the second inquest whilst in the longer term Trewola enjoyed an undisturbed occupancy of the rectory.

The authorities' prudence is also evident in the amendments made to the institutions sub-register. Most of the duplicated entries we mentioned earlier stem from inquisitions. They seem to be cases where a doubt about the presentation arose after the original admission had been made. Inquiries were therefore held which resulted in a fresh entry being made with a later date of institution reflecting the sequence of events. Clergy wanted assurance that they had sound legal title to their benefices. This was certainly the case earlier in the middle ages when the

crown encouraged clerics in its favour to seek preferment by trying to unseat incumbents who had been admitted on the presentation of other patrons.¹³⁹ The amendments to the institutions sub-register provided a defence against such tactics.

No caveats survive for Neville's episcopate or those of his immediate successors. But in the mid sixteenth century a large number were copied into the bishops' registers, often in a rough and ready fashion.¹⁴⁰ Whilst the circumstances may have changed – more gentry were contesting the ownership of manors and advowsons following the dissolution of the monasteries – it is not unreasonable to suppose that caveats were also being entered in the mid fifteenth century and that they prompted both the commissioning of inquiries and the creation of a sub-register devoted to the proceedings of the inquests. Approximately one in seven of all admissions were subjected to this extra layer of scrutiny under Neville.

Bishops were responsible for confirming the elections of the heads of those ecclesiastical corporations that did not claim exemption from episcopal rule.¹⁴¹ Seven elections are recorded in Neville's register. Five involve monasteries (Hartland, Frithelstock (twice), Cornworthy (a nunnery) and Plympton, all belonging to the Augustinian order, one a collegiate college (Slapton) and the other Exeter Cathedral itself where Henry Webber was elected dean in 1459.

Election proceedings are notoriously lengthy documents and those in Neville's register are no exception collectively taking up a sixth of the entire register. They are heavily legalistic and formulaic because bishops had the power to overturn elections they considered flawed.¹⁴² Scribes drew up narratives of the proceedings called decrees of election. Attested by notaries public they were presented to the bishop or his deputies for approval and then copied into the register together with the mandates, commissions and other documents generated by the process of confirming elections.

The resulting records are all rather similar. They begin with the reason for the election. This is followed by the obtaining of a licence to elect from the corporation's patron or founder. Next a meeting is held to agree a date for the election. On the appointed day the corporation assembles in the chapter house singing the hymn *Veni Creator Spiritus*. The new head is chosen who formally accepts the office. Proceedings are concluded by the singing of *Te Deum Laudamus*. The narrative is prepared and given to the bishop who orders the result to be proclaimed to the

local populace and clergy. Those objecting to the outcome are given a day on which to appear before the bishop to make their case. If there are no objectors (and there are none in Neville's register) the election is confirmed. The new head swears obedience to the bishop and is ordered to be inducted into office. He is given letters testimonial as evidence of his election and if he is the head of a religious house he is also blessed.¹⁴³

Important roles were played by the subpriors of the religious houses and the president of the cathedral chapter. They were responsible for the arrangement and conduct of the elections. The electorate of the religious houses and colleges was often small. Only three participated at Slapton and one of them, John Pawle, became rector.¹⁴⁴ In contrast Exeter Cathedral had 24 electors.¹⁴⁵ The proceedings record the summoning of the prebendaries to the election by the fixing of notices of citation to their stalls in the cathedral choir and the appointment of proxies for those that were unable to attend in person. The record also tells us how the prebendaries voted. Webber won a landslide victory with 19 of the 23 votes cast. There were three votes for Thomas Kyrkeby the treasurer whilst Webber himself supported his long-standing friend and colleague Roger Keys.

Church courts proved wills that dealt with personal property.¹⁴⁶ The process was called probate and involved the executors of the testator (or will-maker) presenting the will to the court to establish its authenticity. Once proven the will was copied into the court's records and the executors were granted permission to administer the goods of the deceased.

Ten courts proved wills in the later medieval diocese of Exeter. Those of the bishop and the four archdeacons were the busiest. We have seen that there were two episcopal courts: the audience and the consistory.¹⁴⁷ Both doubled as registries with the former issuing the licences and mandates recorded in the *registrum commune* and overseeing the triennial visitations of the diocese. Granting probate was another of its responsibilities. The audience was part of the episcopal household and followed bishops about their see. Under Stafford and Lacy the manors of Bishop's Clyst, Crediton and Chudleigh were favoured places of residence. William Elyot had an office at Chudleigh in which wills were sometimes proved when he served as Lacy's registrar in the early 1450s.¹⁴⁸

Bishops of Exeter claimed jurisdiction over the wills of knights¹⁴⁹, beneficed clergy, members of their household and inhabitants of the episcopal peculiars.¹⁵⁰ They also laid claim to the wills belonging to the courts of the archdeacons and other lesser jurisdictions when these tribunals were inhibited during episcopal visitations. The consistory most likely processed the testaments of the clergy and peculiars whilst the audience handled the wills of visitations, knights and the episcopal household.

During the course of the fifteenth century the bishop's probate jurisdiction came under attack from the archbishop of Canterbury's prerogative court which claimed the right of probate over the wills of persons dying with goods worth at least £5 in two or more dioceses.¹⁵¹ This was a long-established right which bishops begrudgingly acknowledged but during the fifteenth century the court became more active as it gained its institutional freedom from the archiepiscopal household.¹⁵² Commissaries were appointed to patrol the dioceses of Canterbury province to enforce the prerogative. John Cheyney was chosen for Exeter at the start of Stafford's episcopate. He was empowered to grant probate and to do all else that was necessary.¹⁵³ Roger Keys was similarly commissioned towards the end of Lacy's rule.¹⁵⁴

The prerogative court targetted the more valuable wills of the diocese. These were generally the testaments that were recorded in the bishop's registers. Stafford had begun this practice probably in response to Cheyney's appointment. His register contains 60 wills that he or his deputies proved together with their grants of probate.¹⁵⁵ The testators are chiefly high-ranking clerics but there are also a number of laymen and women who were connected to the bishop and the cathedral. Lacy continued Stafford's work and his register has 40 or more wills to add to the tally.¹⁵⁶ These are further supplemented by the testaments of the nine cathedral prebendaries that Neville's inquisitions sub-register contains.¹⁵⁷

Stafford and Lacy enjoyed long episcopates which enabled them to establish households and administrations capable of withstanding outside interference. This was not the case with Neville, a largely absentee bishop, or his successors in the second half of the fifteenth century, all of whom had short or disturbed tenures as bishops. They did not create strong ties with their diocese and were certainly no match for the durable and wily Archbishops Bourghier and Morton who between

them occupied the archdiocese for almost 50 years.¹⁵⁸ The crown was also happy that this should be so. Henry VII discouraged bishops from spending too much time in their sees: their job was to promote the well-being of the newly-formed Tudor state.¹⁵⁹

This explains why Neville's meagre total of nine wills is followed by just two for Bothe, one for Courtenay and none at all for Fox and his successors. It also provides the context for the bitter dispute that broke out between Archbishop Warham (another long-lasting metropolitan) and his suffragans over probate jurisdiction in the early years of the sixteenth century which is chronicled in Hugh Oldham's register.¹⁶⁰ This was soon followed in 1529 by the Reformation Parliament enacting laws that limited the fees that church courts could charge for proving wills.¹⁶¹

Faced therefore with a reduction in the supply of testaments and in the income they could extract from it, bishops of Exeter re-organised their probate work. A new series of will registers was begun in the 1530s which brought together the probate work of the consistory and audience.¹⁶² This was the start of the institutionalization of the audience court and registry which was completed later in the century when the audience gained its own set of act books.¹⁶³ Bishops abandoned their high-status wills to Canterbury and concentrated on the testaments of parish clergy and laity. They also expanded their probate work by claiming authority over the wills of persons dying with goods in two or more of the lesser jurisdictions of the see. This brought them into conflict with their archdeacons in much the same way as Warham had been confronted by his bishops and led to the 1616 Composition which set down in writing the jurisdictional boundaries of the courts of the diocese.¹⁶⁴

Webber and John Udy proved the prebendaries' wills in the cathedral, probably in the chapel where the consistory met. They received *ad hoc* commissions from Neville and used their seals as official principal and president of the consistory to authenticate their proceedings. They were supported by Elyot as registrar.

The wills reflect the collegiality of the cathedral close. Junior clergy frequently appear as legatees and executors whilst the circulating library of second hand books that is such a feature of Lacy's register continues apace.¹⁶⁵ Before the invention of the printing press new books were both costly and laborious to

produce, so hand-me-downs were greatly prized. Six of the nine wills have bequests of this kind. John Stevenes gave his best portiforium or breviary to Webber¹⁶⁶ who also received a portiforium from Martin Dyer which was probably the book that Dyer had been given by Michael Lercedekne cathedral treasurer in 1442.¹⁶⁷ Stevenes' portiforium had been passed down by John Shute archdeacon of Exeter in 1425 on condition that its recipient give it to another 'honest priest' at the end of his life.¹⁶⁸

Stevenes also bequeathed volumes of religious and philosophical works to Roger Keys who was to give them to the cathedral library on his death which he evidently did because they were among the large quantity of books that the chapter gave to the newly-founded Bodleian Library at Oxford in the early seventeenth century.¹⁶⁹ John Rawe's copy of Holcot's *Lectures on the Book of Wisdom* similarly ended up in the Bodleian after a time in the Exeter chapter library. Stevenes gifted books to William Paulyne the chapter clerk and John Luffyncote deputy chapter clerk whilst Richard Marton left a copy of Gerson's *Sermones Dominicales* to James Richard the vicar of Sidbury.¹⁷⁰ Rawe and Ralph Morewyll both made bequests of books to Exeter College Oxford although in Rawe's case it was more the return of volumes that he had been lent during his lifetime.¹⁷¹ John Morton meanwhile gave copies of de Voragine's *Golden Legend* and de Burgh's *Pupilla Oculi* to Ilfracombe Church for the benefit of future rectors.¹⁷²

Not every book that we know belonged to the testators is named in their registered wills. The final page of Dyer's will is missing but would almost certainly have mentioned the canon and civil law books that Lercedekne had given him on condition they were left to some other 'apt scholar' on his death.¹⁷³ Dyer was working as a notary public in the bishop's registry when Lercedekne made his will.¹⁷⁴ A few years later he became Lacy's registrar, a position he held until the early 1450s when he abandoned his legal work for service in the Church.¹⁷⁵ This change of course was foreshadowed in 1442 when Lercedekne gave him his 'little portiforium' on the understanding that he became a priest and remained unmarried, both of which things he did.¹⁷⁶ Dyer's reward was to be collated to the livings of Goran and Paignton and to prebends at Crantock, Crediton, Glasney and Exeter

Cathedral.¹⁷⁷ The preamble to his will shows him to be a man of strong religious principles.

Stevenes also began his working life as an ecclesiastical bureaucrat assisting Archbishop Arundel's registrar.¹⁷⁸ This was at the beginning of the fifteenth century. Like Dyer he took orders whilst working for Arundel and within a few years had begun to accumulate prebends including one at Exeter in 1413 which was his home diocese. Stevenes was a more prominent figure than Dyer and his time in the archbishop's registry gave him access to records of substance and interest which he copied into a formulary or reference book. These included the letters of Archbishop Pecham dating from the late thirteenth century and correspondence involving Kings Richard II and Henry IV.¹⁷⁹

When Stevenes made his will he was approaching 80 and wanted to raise capital to finance a charitable project that he had begun earlier when he had built almshouses for 13 poor persons in St Katherine's Street Exeter near to the Dominican friary and just outside the northern boundary of the cathedral close.¹⁸⁰ His will instructs his executors to sell the remainder of his books among which was the formulary book that is now All Souls College Ms 182. The book got to Oxford courtesy of the ubiquitous William Elyot who succeeded Stevenes as rector of Blackawton in 1459 and who doubtless knew Stevenes and his library well. Elyot moved quickly to secure his purchase probably with the aim of advancing the career of a relative, perhaps his brother John, but for some reason the book remained in William's possession and so in 1483 he gifted it to All Souls for the benefit of scholars at the same time as he gave other manuscript volumes to Exeter College and New College Oxford.¹⁸¹

(d) Ordinations

Twenty-four ordination ceremonies were held in the diocese of Exeter during Neville's episcopate. The bishop himself ordained on three occasions, two in 1459 and one at the end of his rule in 1465.¹⁸² The remainder were conducted by suffragans specially commissioned for the purpose. Five suffragans served at different times during Neville's episcopate: Roderick Barrett bishop of Killala (1456-

57)¹⁸³, James Blakedon bishop of Bangor (1458)¹⁸⁴, Thomas Barrett bishop of Annadown (1458-61)¹⁸⁵, John Valens bishop of Tenos (1461-62)¹⁸⁶ and Simon Elvington bishop of Connor (1463-65)¹⁸⁷.

The ceremonies were of two kinds, general and special, depending on the dates in the Christian calendar on which they were held. General orders were celebrated on the Saturdays of the four Ember weeks of the year. This was an ancient custom of the Church. Ember weeks were times of prayer and fasting and marked the seasons of the year. Ember Saturdays fell in the first week of Lent (February or March depending on the date of Easter), on the eve of Trinity Sunday (May or June again depending on the date of Easter), after Holy Rood day (14 September) and after St Lucy's day (13 December). Special orders were celebrated on the Saturday before Passion Sunday (when the office of *Sitientes*¹⁸⁸ was sung) and Easter Saturday. These extra two days were permitted because it was recognized that busy bishops could not always be expected to adhere rigidly to the four Ember Saturdays.

There were 21 general ceremonies, 18 of which were held in St Mary Major church opposite the west front of the cathedral. Crediton Collegiate church, the charnel chapel in the cathedral cemetery and the cathedral itself were the other venues. The three special ceremonies were held in Great Torrington and Buckland Filleigh churches and the cathedral. The ordinations register also records four 'progresses' that suffragans made about the diocese as part of their duties during which they ordained what were probably teenage boys to the grade of *tonsuratus*, the first step on the ladder leading to the priesthood.

In all 1279 orders were conferred during Neville's episcopate. The table below shows their apportionment between the five grades of minor and major orders. The bracketed figures are the number of orders within these totals that were conferred on members of religious houses known as regular clergy to distinguish them from their secular or parochial counterparts.

Minor orders comprised the offices of ostler, lector, exorcist and acolyte but only the last is regularly found in later medieval ordination lists. Unlike those seeking to become subdeacons, deacons and priests, candidates for minor orders were not obliged to remain celibate nor were they required to have a title or other means of financial support to sustain themselves as clerics. The step from acolyte to subdeacon was thus an extremely significant one.

Bishops were legally responsible for the men they ordained and so it was important that ordinands were of good quality.¹⁸⁹ Examination of candidates usually took place on the days leading up to the six Saturdays when ordination ceremonies were held. Although this was the job of the archdeacons by right, bishops tended to appoint whoever they felt was competent to do the work. In 1315 Stapeldon chose his official to examine candidates for major orders and two others to scrutinise those seeking to become acolytes and *tonsurati*.¹⁹⁰ Hugh Oldham's register in the early sixteenth century consistently notes the names of the examiners against those of the successful ordinands.¹⁹¹

Nothing explicit is said about the examination process in Neville's register and so we can only assume that the necessary checks were carried out just as they probably were for admissions to livings. Once again age, birth, morals and learning were important criteria. *Tonsurati* needed to be 7 years old, acolytes 14, subdeacons 17, deacons 23 and priests 24. All had to be of legitimate birth although dispensations seem readily to have been granted to overcome this obstacle. Given the numbers involved the examinations cannot have been especially demanding and indeed contemporary manuals say as much. De Burgh's *Pupilla Oculi* which was written with parish clergy in mind states that candidates were not to be rigorously examined but dealt with speedily and with moderation. Perfection was not to be expected.¹⁹²

How many failed to meet these modest standards and how many returned for another attempt at a later date is impossible to say. But it seems likely that most time was spent on ensuring that those secular clergy seeking major orders had an adequate source of income because this would have an immediate impact on the bishop. If a newly ordained man lacked a sufficient title (in the language of the registers) then the diocesan would have to support him out of his own pocket. Titles could be a benefice, a presentation to a benefice or a patrimony which was usually an annuity paid out of rents. Five marks seem to have been a minimum financial requirement.¹⁹³

During the fourteenth century monasteries and other ecclesiastical corporations became the chief providers of titles. This was probably a result of the economic recession that began in the aftermath of the Black Death. There is a well-founded suspicion that monastic titles were little more than promises of employment and may have been provided to meet the needs of the Church rather than those of their recipients.¹⁹⁴ Certainly they were being granted in great numbers by Neville's time. Between 1456 and 1465 St Nicholas' Priory in Exeter and Launceston Priory were the most active issuing 91 and 84 titles respectively. They were followed by Bodmin Priory (57), Buckfast Abbey (37) and Tywardreath Priory (also 37). Only 6 men relied on non-monastic titles: four were rectors, one a vicar and the other, William Gosehill, had an annuity worth five marks.

Letters dimissory are also regularly recorded in Neville's ordination register. Candidates for orders were supposed to seek ordination in the diocese where they were born, resided or held a living. But it had long been a practice in the English Church for bishops or their deputies to grant candidates permission to seek orders in other dioceses 'from any catholic bishop'. This might be for all orders or for specific grades. Diocesans granting letters dimissory were responsible for ensuring that the recipients were sufficiently qualified. During Neville's episcopate at least 340 orders were conferred on men from Exeter diocese by other bishops.¹⁹⁵ The neighbouring see of Bath & Wells was a popular destination as was Salisbury whilst Winchester and Worcester were also frequented. Meanwhile Neville and his suffragans conferred some 80 orders on in-comers from as far as field as St Asaph in North Wales and the Channel Islands which were then part of the diocese of Coutances in Normandy.

Clergy were among the most mobile of social groups in later medieval England and no discussion of clerical recruitment at this time can be considered complete without including the many clerics who travelled up and down the country in search of orders and employment. There were a number of reasons for this mobility. Not all bishops held ordination ceremonies regularly and Neville and Webber could certainly have held more. Possibly examinations were less thorough when letters dimissory were issued. Perhaps, too, career opportunities beckoned. London diocese was a popular destination for men from the south west during the later middle ages with the capital offering a wider range of employment.¹⁹⁶ Then there were those who were going to university – Oxford mainly – who would obtain a title from one of the city's monasteries and seek ordination from a nearby bishop.

Ultimately the Church was seen as a safe haven in times of political and economic unrest. For many fifteenth century ordinands an ecclesiastical career was really a

job, a distinction which disappeared after the Reformation when the clerical workforce was much reduced in size and almost exclusively graduate. Lower class, poorly educated men and boys were no longer welcome or needed to staff what had become as a result of doctrinal and political changes a professional and socially exclusive institution.

In the presence of John Wolston rector of Lezant²⁸², John Symon rector of Stokeinteignhead²⁸³, Edward Hill clerk, John Kirton and Richard Druell of Exeter and others, he orders an inquiry into the right of patronage. 465. 2 Jun 1458: Webber commissions the archdeacon of Exeter¹⁴⁰¹ or his official and John Stapelhyll of Exeter diocese to sequester the revenues of Kenn rectory. D William Latham the current rector has allowed the rectory to fall into disrepair.¹⁴⁰² A suitable portion of the revenues is to be reserved for Latham to sustain himself and to meet outgoings.¹⁴⁰³

The terms of the grant are recited: half is due on the feast of St Martin 1463¹⁴⁴⁹ and half on 11 Nov 1464. The exceptions are as for **467**. The mandate also includes a long list of senior clergy who were absent from the session of Convocation held between 8 and 25 Nov 1462 when the second half of the tenth was granted. Because they did not incur attendance costs and thus gain exemption from the tenth they must now pay the second instalment. Among them are M Peter Courtenay archdeacon of Exeter¹⁴⁵⁰, M Thomas Marke archdeacon of Cornwall¹⁴⁵¹, M Thomas Mannyng archdeacon of Totnes¹⁴⁵², M William Fulford archdeacon of

Barnstaple¹⁴⁵³, the abbots of Tavistock¹⁴⁵⁴, Buckfast¹⁴⁵⁵, Buckland¹⁴⁵⁶, Torre¹⁴⁵⁷ and Dunkeswell¹⁴⁵⁸ and the priors of Plympton¹⁴⁵⁹, Launceston¹⁴⁶⁰, Bodmin¹⁴⁶¹ and St German's.¹⁴⁶² The mandate orders Neville to make arrangements for the collection of the tenth in his diocese and to certify that he has done so to the Exchequer on or before the octave of St Hilary 1463.¹⁴⁶³

474. 20 Dec 1463: the King orders Webber to administer the oath of office of sheriff of Devon to Richard Chichestre.¹⁴⁹³ Webber certifies that he has done so on 24 Jan 1464.

475.¹⁴⁹⁴ 10 Feb 1464: Neville at Exeter Place London certifies to the Exchequer that he has received the King's mandate of 24 Aug 1463¹⁴⁹⁵ referring to the meeting of Canterbury Convocation held in St Paul's Cathedral London from 6 Jul to 23 Jul 1463 which granted the king a tenth of all benefices taxed and untaxed that are accustomed to pay the tax in the southern province. The terms of the grant are recited in the mandate. Half is due on the feast of the Annunciation 1464.¹⁴⁹⁶ The exceptions are those for **469** and (as before) a schedule is attached listing the benefices that are taxed, unappropriated and unaccustomed to pay tenths whose annual value is no more than twelve marks and whose incumbents are either resident or are licensed to be absent because they are studying at university.¹⁴⁹⁷ He has today appointed the abbot of Tavistock¹⁴⁹⁸ to be deputy collector for the first half of the tenth in Devon.

477. 3 Aug 1463: Neville in London receives from Kempe¹⁵⁰² a copy of Bourgchier's letter of 20 Jul¹⁵⁰³ informing him of the clerical subsidy that Convocation had granted by indenture that day and which was to be paid by all unbeneficed chaplains both regular and secular, exempt and unexempt, on the feast of the birth of the Virgin Mary.¹⁵⁰⁴ The rates of payment are 6s 8d for those in receipt of an annual stipend of £5 (or food and clothing and a stipend of 4 marks), 13s 4d for those whose stipend was 10 marks and 20s for those who received £10. Chaplains in receipt of pensions and those serving chantries, free chapels and hospitals are also liable. Exemptions are granted to vicars choral of cathedrals and colleges, poor chaplains in Oxbridge Colleges, chaplains accused of or imprisoned for crimes whose good reputation has been certified by their bishops and chaplains who are decrepit and aged.

479. 31 Aug 1463: Webber reports to Bourghier and Neville. The archdeacons and their officials have today provided lists of the names of the chaplains in their jurisdictions and the amounts assessed on them and this information is appended in a schedule. M Peter Courtenay is archdeacon of Exeter¹⁵¹¹ and M John Comb his official,¹⁵¹² M Thomas Marke is archdeacon of Cornwall¹⁵¹³ and M John Pascowe his official,¹⁵¹⁴ M Thomas Mannyng is archdeacon of Totnes¹⁵¹⁵ and M Richard John his official,¹⁵¹⁶ and M William Fulford is archdeacon of Barnstaple¹⁵¹⁷ and M John Attewill his official.¹⁵¹⁸ They are answerable to Bourghier for the subsidy on the feast of the birth of the Virgin Mary.¹⁵¹⁹ Webber's report also lists a number of exemptions for poverty: the vicars choral of Exeter Cathedral, Crediton College, Ottery St Mary College, Glasney College and Crantock College, the cathedral annuellars, the master and brothers of the Hospital of St John the Baptist Exeter, the priests of the Hospital of Clyst St Gabriel and the chaplain of Slapton College.

480. 31 May 1464: Neville receives copies of the papal letters apostolic from Kempe bishop of London which had been sent to Archbishop Bourgchier. Pius II wishes to organise a crusade against the Turks who are advancing through south-eastern Europe - the fall of Constantinople, Greece, Bosnia and Serbia are mentioned - and money is to be raised for this from the sale of indulgences throughout the catholic church. Bourgchier orders Kempe to ensure that his fellow bishops publish the letters in their dioceses. The letters are dated 22 Oct 1463 at St Peter's Rome, Bourgchier's instructions to Kempe are dated 12 Mar 1464 and Kempe's letter to Neville is dated 5 Apr 1464.

481. 12 Jan 1465: Kempe writes to Neville from his palace in London¹⁵⁹⁷ reciting the letters apostolic Archbishop Bourgchier has received from Pope Paul II. Pius II died on 15 Aug 1464 and Paul has succeeded him. Preparations for the crusade are continuing and help from the Church at large is still needed. Bourgchier orders Kempe to ensure that Pius II's letters about the indulgence should continue to be published. 482. 20 Oct 1460: Neville at Exeter formally dismisses the case that the parishioners of Cury a dependant chapelry of Breage have brought against Hailes Abbey the proprietors of Breage.¹⁵⁹⁸ At a recent episcopal visitation¹⁵⁹⁹ the parishioners complained about the abbey's failure to observe the terms of the appropriation which they said required two monks to reside at Cury, provide hospitality and distribute money to the poor. The parties appeared before Webber in the consistory court in Exeter Cathedral on 4 Mar 1460. Because the parishioners were unable to provide written proof of the monks' obligations Webber had rejected their claim. Thomas Treugans appeared as the abbey's proctor and M John Thrynge¹⁶⁰⁰ represented the parishioners.

The monks of Hartland have elected Richard Tawton²⁰²⁹ in succession to his namesake Richard Tawton who died on 1 Jun 1462. They wish their election to be confirmed by Neville and have submitted an account of their proceedings²⁰³⁰ attested by William Elyot clerk np of Exeter diocese.²⁰³¹ It states that Henry Shyre subprior and his fellow monks, Thomas Taylor, Thomas Leyman, Richard Tawton, John Smyth, John Justa and Walter Parnecote, obtained a licence to elect from John Dinham armig whose family founded the monastery and who is patron. Shyre and his colleagues then joined with Thomas Rede prior of Frithelstock, a fellow Augustinian house which by a composition of Bishop Stapeldon participated in elections at Hartland²⁰³², and elected Tawton in their chapter house on 28 Jun. On 4 Jul Dinham notified Neville that he had given his consent to the election and on the following day the bishop at Exeter Place London commissioned Webber to scrutinize the monks' proceedings and confirm Tawton as the new abbot. On 15 Jul D Robert Crane chaplain curate of Stoke St Nectan²⁰³³ certifies to Webber that in accordance with Neville's mandate he has proclaimed Tawton's election to the local clergy and populace calling upon objectors to appear before Webber. As there are none Webber confirms the election in Exeter Cathedral. On the same day the vicar-general gives Tawton corporal possession of the abbacy and on 17 Jul Tawton professes obedience to Neville and is blessed by John bishop of Tenos²⁰³⁴; John

They wish their election to be confirmed by Neville and have submitted an account of their proceedings to Webber at Frithelstock on 18 Jun which is attested by William Elyot the bishop's registrar.²⁰⁴⁰ It states that Richard Weller snr canon and president of the chapter, his fellow monks John Pleder, Richard Martyn, John Osbourne and John Bromford and Richard Tawton abbot of Hartland and Smyth elected Smyth in their chapter house on 11 Jun. The witnesses include Thomas Googh chaplain, William Person chaplain²⁰⁴¹, John Syms chaplain and John Ryse lit²⁰⁴² all from Exeter diocese and John Elyot lit of Bath & Wells diocese.²⁰⁴³ On 18 Jun Webber orders the rural deans of Hartland and Torrington, John Symon clerk²⁰⁴⁴ and John Davy lit to proclaim Smyth's election to the local clergy and populace in an archidiaconal chapter held in Great Torrington church. Those objecting to the election are to appear before Webber in Frithelstock church on 20 Jun. On that day Davy certifies that the proclamation has been made and in the absence of objectors Webber confirms the election. Smyth professes his obedience to Neville the same day.

Tremayne is patron through the inheritance of North Huish manor to which the advowson belongs and last presented. There is no litigation about the benefice nor any pensions or portions due. Jakey is free, legitimate, suitable, honest, in priest's orders and aged 32. He has no other livings.²⁰⁵⁴

John Germyn the cathedral chancellor²⁰⁵⁷ and president of the chapter has submitted an account of their proceedings which is attested by M Richard Daber clerk of Exeter diocese np.²⁰⁵⁸ It states that the canons obtained a licence to elect from Neville and called an election for 26 Dec. William Paulyn chaplain²⁰⁵⁹ cited the canons in the customary way by fixing notices to their stalls in the cathedral choir. Twenty-three of the 24 prebendaries²⁰⁶⁰ took part in the election: Roger Keys archdeacon of
