The Vacancy of 1465¹

Neville had been favourite to move to York since September 1464 when the king had granted him custody of the archdiocese's temporalities following the death of Archbishop William Booth.² But his translation could not proceed until a replacement had been found for him at Exeter. This was John Bothe³, William Booth's nephew, who was archdeacon of Richmond and Edward IV's secretary. Both Neville and Bothe were provided to their sees by the papacy on 15 March 1465 doubtless in response to the king's promptings.⁴ Neville's last recorded act as bishop of Exeter was on 30 March whilst Bothe's episcopal register was begun on 24 June.⁵ Earlier, on 12 June, Bothe had received his see's temporalities from the crown and at some stage – we do not know when – he was elected bishop by the Exeter dean and chapter who were no doubt relieved that there was to be no repetition of the events that had surrounded Neville's appointment a decade earlier.⁶ Bothe was consecrated on 7 July.⁷

There is no *sede vacante* record for the vacancy probably because there was no need for one. Archbishop Bourgchier was content to sit on the sidelines and allow Henry Webber, the dean of Exeter and Neville's vicar-general, to continue in office carrying out the duties that he had performed for the past ten years. The final pages of Neville's institution register record the admissions that Webber made during April, May and early June.⁸ It was no surprise that Bothe's first recorded act as bishop was to renew Webber's commission and so secure a seamless transition from one regime to the next.⁹

Bothe's background and early career

Bothe was a northerner like Neville but from a less distinguished background. He was the third son of Sir Robert Booth of Barton upon Irwell, Lancashire and his wife Dowse the daughter of Sir William Venables. Several of Bothe's relatives were prominent clerics. In addition to his uncle William, his father's half-brother Laurence was bishop of Durham whilst his cousin and namesake, John, was treasurer of Lichfield. When Bothe became bishop of Exeter he advanced the careers of Hamond and Richard Bothe who were probably nephews or cousins. 11

Bothe studied civil law at Cambridge during the 1450s, graduating BCL, and was appointed master of Gonville Hall in or shortly before 1456. His first recorded

benefice was the rectory of Thornton-le-Moor, Cheshire in 1451, to which he was presented by his father who was patron of the living. This suggests that Bothe may have been born in the early or mid 1420s as it was necessary to be aged 25 to be beneficed. In due course, Bothe acquired other livings: Barnack in Northamptonshire, Girton in Cambridgeshire, Leigh in Lancashire and St Mary Magdalene, Old Fish Street, London. His uncle William promoted him to the posts of treasurer of York Minster, provost of Beverley Minster (both in 1457) and archdeacon of Richmond (1459). Bothe also became warden of Manchester College in 1459 and prebendary of Mapesbury in St Paul's Cathedral London in 1464.

William and Laurence Booth enjoyed close ties with Henry VI and his queen, Margaret of Anjou. But they successfully transferred their allegiances to Edward IV when Henry was overthrown. John benefitted from this. He became secretary to the new king in 1462 and chancellor of Cambridge University the following year. Promotion to the bench of bishops was a natural next step in his career.¹²

Bothe as bishop of Exeter

Bothe was another absentee spending only four of his 13 years as bishop in the south-west. But he achieved considerably more than his predecessor Neville. This was because he was a royal servant and avoided political entanglements. His appointment was part of an attempt to increase the presence of the Yorkist regime in the south-west where the pro-Lancastrian branch of the Courtenay family was still influential. Bothe introduced new men into his administration and restored the episcopal household to its central place in diocesan government. He also revitalised the cathedral chapter by appointing new prebendaries and by resolving its longstanding financial problems.

There were two halves to Bothe's episcopate. The first, during the later 1460s, saw the bishop begin to put his plans into action. He was then set back by the Readeption crisis of 1469-71 when Henry VI was briefly restored to the throne. Once Edward IV had regained power and rid himself of his most dangerous opponents Bothe was able to resume his work in a more confident fashion which gave his successor, Peter Courtenay, a strong base to work from.

Bothe did not set foot in his diocese until the beginning of 1467.¹⁶ He was probably still king's secretary at the beginning of his episcopate and could not be released from this job. Webber was very much in charge in the diocese during these early months. His commission as vicar-general which Bothe issued from London on 19 June 1465 was almost identical to the one that he had received from Neville a decade earlier.¹⁷

Once in his diocese, however, Bothe quickly got down to work basing himself at Chudleigh manor from where he launched a visitation of his see in May 1467. Travelling via Exeter, Crediton and north Devon he entered Cornwall reaching Penryn in the west of the county in mid June. This was home territory for bishops of Exeter. Penryn lay within the episcopal peculiar of St Gluvias and Budock whilst just to the south of the town was Glasney College which Bishop Bronescombe had founded in 1267. It was staffed by 13 secular canons and vicars as well as a number of chantry priests and other minor clergy. It was a centre of learning and worship and served as a base for episcopal government in Cornwall. The bishop's manors of Penryn Minster and Foreign were also nearby.

Bothe returned to Exeter in mid July going straight to Bishop's Clyst manor where he remained for the next 18 months. It is noticeable that he shunned his cathedral city preferring out-of-town residences from which to direct affairs. This was a return to the days of Lacy and his predecessors. Admissions to benefices were made at Clyst and probably also ordination ceremonies were held in the manorial chapel but the loss of Bothe's ordinations sub-register prevents us being certain about this.

Bothe would have used existing staff to mount his visitation. Webber as chief judge, William Elyot who had retained his position as bishop's registrar²⁰ and the officials of the episcopal peculiars were all likely to have played key roles.²¹ But alongside them were the new men whom Bothe had brought with him and introduced into his admiinistration. All were university graduates with connections to the midlands and the north. Bothe either knew them or they had been recommended to him.

Chief among them was Owen Lloyd who was a doctor of civil law and a contemporary of Bothe's at Oxford.²² He probably came from the Welsh borders. Hereford may well have been his home diocese judging by the number of manuscript books on law, theology and philosophy that he left to the cathedral on his death by which time he had become one of its prebendaries.²³ Lloyd's early career was spent in the neighbouring see of Coventry and Lichfield where he served as offical of Bishop Boulers and chancellor of Bishop Hals. It was in this latter role that he also served Bothe. He first appears in the records at Penryn during the 1467 visitation.²⁴

Chancellors were originally bishops' secretaries.²⁵ But by the fifteenth century they had acquired more substantial duties becoming heads of episcopal households and judges of audience courts.²⁶ This was probably what Lloyd did at Exeter. His appointment marked a reassertion of the importance of the bishop's *familia*, the private, informal face of episcopal government as opposed to the public, formal image that Webber as official principal fostered.²⁷

Lloyd severed his ties with his old see when he exchanged the living of Solihull in the west midlands for that of Holsworthy in north Devon in September 1467.²⁸ Richard Neville earl of Warwick was the patron of Solihull whilst Anne duchess of Exeter, Edward IV's sister, presented Lloyd to Holsworthy. Bishop Hals initiated the transfer and Bothe carried it out. Lloyd was evidently closely associated with the new regime whilst Hals, the former dean of Exeter and protege of Margaret of Anjou,²⁹ was another senior cleric who had successfully negotiated the change of dynasty.

Lloyd did not work alone at Exeter. John Stubbes, a Cambridge bachelor of civil law, was also on hand.³⁰ A younger man, Stubbes was beneficed in Yorkshire and held a prebend in St Chad's College Shrewsbury to which he had been collated by Hals in 1466. By the following April, however, he was with Bothe at Chudleigh.³¹ This was the start of a rapid rise to prominence in the south-west. In the course of the next 12 months Stubbes was collated to prebends at St Teath, Glasney and Exeter Cathedral where he was soon joined by Lloyd.³²

The two men continued to prosper from their relationship with Bothe in the 1470s. Lloyd became treasurer of Crediton and archdeacon of Barnstaple, the latter in succession to Stubbes who had resigned the archdeaconry for the cathedral treasurership which he then promptly relinquished for the more senior post of cathedral precentor.³³ Lloyd himself surrendered Barnstaple for the archdeaconry of Totnes in so doing making way for Robert Barforth another Cambridge civilian who had come into the diocese in 1467.³⁴ Barforth, who quickly became precentor of Crediton, succeeded Stubbes as cathedral treasurer before moving on to the archdeaconry.³⁵ He and Stubbes were 'head officers' in Bothe's household by the time of the bishop's death.³⁶

Other incomers in the later 1460s who progressed to better things in the next decade were Henry Molyneux, John Burton and Robert Aiscough.³⁷ Molyneux was collated to the rectory of Lezant in Cornwall, an episcopal peculiar which was often allocated to upwardly mobile clerics.³⁸ Burton meanwhile was collated to Goran vicarage also in Cornwall and Stockleigh Pomeroy rectory in Devon whilst Aiscough became a prebendary of Exeter Cathedral having briefly held the vicarage of St Austell (Cornwall) and the chantry of Washbourne (Devon).³⁹ In the next decade Molyneux and Burton joined Aiscough in the cathedral close whilst Aiscough became archdeacon of Exeter and prebendary of Glasney.⁴⁰ It is likely that all three men were members of the episcopal household at some stage during Bothe's episcopate.

Finally there is Nicholas Gosse. He was a much older man and a native of the south west. But he chose to develop his career away from Exeter, firstly at Oxford where in the 1450s he was the head of a number of undergraduate halls and served as university preacher, then in Coventry and Lichfield diocese where he became a prebendary of St Chad's Shrewsbury and finally at York where Archbishop William Booth collated him to prebends in Southwell and York Minsters. When Booth's nephew became bishop of Exeter, Gosse returned to his home diocese to become chancellor of Exeter Cathedral in 1466. Later, following Webber's death in 1477, he served as Bothe's vicar-general, a position he shared with Owen Lloyd.

Including Stubbes, Aiscough and Lloyd, Bothe appointed 11 new prebendaries of Exeter Cathedral in the first half of his episcopate. Most do not appear in the institutions sub-register.⁴⁴ We know about them because of the survival of the cathedral stewards' accounts which record the income and expenditure of the chapter and the quarterly payments made to prebendaries.⁴⁵ The table below summarises the newcomers' careers and backgrounds.

Many of Bothe's appointees became residentiaries of the cathedral.⁴⁷ This gave them control over the chapter's affairs and a greater level of income. The Exeter chapter practised a system of common ownership in which its assets were held jointly by the 24 prebendaries who each received £1 every quarter from the cathedral exchequer.⁴⁸ If a prebendary wanted more he would need to reside in the close for a minimum of 46 days in each of the four terms of the ecclesiastical year.⁴⁹ This entitled him to allowances for food, drink and hospitality and a share of the profits from the capitular estates once the income from the manors and churches that was due to the exchequer had been paid.⁵⁰

The system was designed to encourage residence and in the later middle ages 15 or so prebendaries normally lived in the close at any one time.⁵¹ These were the men who dealt with the financial and other issues that daily arose in the running of the chapter. The full body of prebendaries, the so-called greater chapter, was only summoned on special occasions such as when a bishop or dean was to be elected.⁵²

The tradition of sharing goods in common was established by Bishop Leofric in the middle of the eleventh century.⁵³ The chapter then was part of the episcopal household. But soon afterwards it gained its independence.⁵⁴ The offices of dean, precentor, chancellor and treasurer were created and manors and churches gifted.⁵⁵ Increasing wealth and status quickly undermined Leofric's idealism. By the middle of the thirteenth century, prebendaries were farming capitular estates for an annual rent.⁵⁶ They were reluctant to reside in the close. In 1382, after an attempt by a rogue group of prebendaries to gain papal approval for the permanent attachment of estates to their prebends, Bishop Brantingham forbade the practice of farming altogether and reimposed Leofric's principles of common ownership.⁵⁷

It was a bad time to attempt to turn the clock back. Economic recession made rent collection difficult.⁵⁸ The chapter also became negligent about the administration of its estates and debts soon mounted.⁵⁹ By the middle of the fifteenth century the resources of the exchequer were exhausted.⁶⁰ The prebendaries appealed to Bishop Lacy for help and in 1446 he established an emergency fund out of the revenues of cathedral chantries that were unserved because of their poverty.⁶¹ This money was now to be used to pay the prebendaries' allowances.⁶²

Earlier in the same century the chapter had ceased direct farming of the demesnes of its manors and had leased them out in small parcels to freeholders and other tenants.⁶³ This enabled the chapter's income to remain stable but did nothing to address the long-term debts that had arisen as a result of tenants defaulting on their rental payments.⁶⁴

This was where Bothe and his 'new men' came in. The bishop seems to have authorised or overseen a write off of the oldest debts to give the chapter a fresh start and he also ensured that a clear record of the surplus profits (or excrescences as they were now called) paid to the prebendaries was kept.⁶⁵ Like the measures before, it was a temporary solution to a long-term problem. The chapter's approach to its estates was inherently conservative.⁶⁶ No attempt, for example, was made to lease out the tithes of its churches *en bloc* until the end of the fifteenth century by which time debts were on the rise again.⁶⁷

The eventual solution was to turn residence into a privilege rather than a right. Would-be residentiaries were obliged to show that they had an annual net income of £40 and also pay an entry fine of £40 known as caution money which was divided among the minor clergy of the cathedral. These rules were in force by Bishop Oldham's time in the early sixteenth century. There was also an attempt to limit the number of residentiaries: a prebendary could not come into residence until one of 15 houses in the close set aside for this purpose had fallen vacant. Finally, in 1561, Bishop Alley permanently reduced the number of residentiaries to nine. They comprised, usually, the five dignitaries of the cathedral and the four archdeacons of the diocese.

Bothe left the south-west around New Year 1469 and returned to London. At least this is what we must surmise because the bishop almost entirely disappears from the records for the next three years. We know that he was at Exeter Place, his London residence, in July 1469 and again in January 1472.⁷³ In between he crops up at East Horsley manor in Sussex⁷⁴ in January 1469 (presumably *en route* for London) and again in January 1470.

These were unsettled times.⁷⁵ The stability of the early years of Edward IV's reign was over as the king and his most powerful subject, Warwick, fell out over the former's marriage to Elizabeth Woodville and the latter's wish for a French alliance. There was unrest in the country reminiscent of the final years of Henry VI's rule. Presumably Bothe had been summoned back to the capital to assist Edward in his

troubles. But if so it was of no avail because in the autumn of 1470 the king was forced to flee the country by an upsurge in popular support for Warwick and Edward's estranged brother the duke of Clarence after they had returned from exile in France where they had allied themselves with the Lancastrians under Margaret of Anjou. Warwick restored Henry VI to the throne and a brief period of peace followed.

The south-west played its part in these events as it had done in the outbreak of the Wars of the Roses. In the spring of 1469 members of the Courtenay family led an uprising against Yorkist rule whilst in September 1470 Dartmouth was probably the port of entry into the realm for Warwick and his forces. Five months earlier Exeter had received Warwick and Clarence on their way into exile and in April 1471 it also welcomed Margaret of Anjou. Church government continued under Webber but it is noticeable that admissions to benefices fell sharply in 1470 and 1471 compared to the bumper years of 1467 and 1468. Bothe kept in touch with his diocese as Neville had done authorising letters of signification that were sent to the royal chancery seeking the issue of writs for the arrest of stubborn excommunicates.

The instability of the Readeption government was exposed when Edward also staged an invasion from the continent in the spring of 1471. Clarence soon defected to his brother and this fatally weakened Warwick's position. Brought to battle at Barnet in April the earl was killed and a month later at Tewkesbury Henry VI's son and heir, Prince Edward, met a similar fate. Margaret of Anjou and her husband were taken prisoner and the Yorkists regained power.

Now that his main opponents were out of the way, Edward IV was a far more assured ruler and this transmitted itself to the realm at large. His servants such as Bothe were beneficiaries. The bishop joined the royal council and became a fully paid up member of the Yorkist elite, acquiring a house in the increasingly fashionable Chelsea where numerous senior clerics, government officials and city merchants had their residences.⁸¹

Bothe did not neglect his diocese. He was eager to carry on the work he had begun in the previous decade. Between the summers of 1474 and 1477 he spent half his time in the south-west.⁸² In 1476 he conducted a visitation of his see and may also have done so in 1473.⁸³ Bothe had a new registrar to help him. William Elyot, who had held the post since the early 1450s, last appears in this role in 1469.⁸⁴ He had become master of God's House at Portsmouth in 1461 and was getting on in

years.⁸⁵ His focus was perhaps elsewhere. Nicholas Crese who succeeded Elyot was also in his fifties but was a well-qualified canon lawyer who had been to Oxford, held the rectory of St Martin's in Exeter and worked as a proctor in the bishop's courts.⁸⁶ He seems to have combined the offices of consistory and episcopal registrar, a particularly demanding brief.⁸⁷

In 1472, Bothe, in whose gift the registrarships lay, decided that Crese's talents were best deployed elsewhere and collated him to the precentorship of Ottery St Mary College replacing him as bishop's registrar with John Ryse who was probably the same man who served as dean of St Buryan and cathedral treasurer in the early sixteenth century.⁸⁸ Ryse remained as registrar to the end of Bothe's episcopate.⁸⁹ Later he succeeded Elyot at God's House when the latter retired and took a pension in 1493.⁹⁰

Bothe's final years saw a significant change in the composition of his clergy. Over a 100 of those admitted to livings were graduates with the bishop using his patronage to support men whom he most favoured. This included the collation of 14 more cathedral prebendaries. Bothe's last calendar year as bishop was also his busiest with 64 admissions occurring, 39 of which were caused by the death of the previous incumbent. Henry Webber, the dean of Exeter, was one of these casualties. He died in February 1477 and was quickly succeeded by Edward IV's 'trusty and right well-beloved councillor' Peter Courtenay, the former archdeacon of Exeter. Courtenay's appointment was timely because very soon after Webber's death Bothe suffered a major stroke which obliged the chapter to take charge of his affairs. The king wrote to the prebendaries to thank them for their actions. Bothe's 'grievous infirmities' had 'greatly abated' 'his health as [well as] his natural discretion'. His finances needed to be safeguarded and his household reduced in size 'by avoiding of such persons as you think not needful nor profitable'. Edward was worried about the money that the prelate owed to the crown. Barforth and Stubbes – Bothe's 'head officers' - were specifically exempted from the king's strictures.

In the event Bothe not only survived for another 12 months but also recovered sufficiently to continue with his plans for revitalising church government at Exeter. Webber's demise was an opportunity rather than a crisis and Bothe continued to work at Bishop's Clyst until the mid-summer when he moved back to London and then to East Horsley where he stayed for the remainder of his episcopate.⁹⁴ He

died on 5 April 1478 and was buried in the chancel of East Horsley church.⁹⁵ Subsequently obit masses for his soul were established in Exeter Cathedral and Ottery St Mary College using money that Bothe had bequeathed.⁹⁶

Bothe's Register

When new Bothe's register probably had at least 100 folios. Today it has 76. The main loss is the ordinations sub-register but at least seven folios have also disappeared from the inquisitions section. These losses occurred before Bothe's register was foliated in the later sixteenth century. It is likely to have been in a neglected and disorganised state at this time. Whoever did the foliation (which is in arabic numerals) went on to foliate the equally diminished registers of Bothe's successors, Peter Courtenay, Richard Fox and Oliver King bringing them together to form a single volume of 173 folios which is listed in the inventory of episcopal records of 1641.

Today this volume includes a further two registers, those of Richard Redmayne and John Arundell, which were separate in 1641 and whose foliation is also in arabic numerals but in a different hand. PRedmayne and Arundell were added at some point during the two centuries that followed the 1641 inventory when they, Bothe, Courtenay, Fox and King were combined with the register of George Neville to form a single volume numbered XII. In the 1920s, Neville's register was reinstated as a separate entity becoming register 12 part 1 whilst the registers of Bothe, Courtenay, Fox, King, Redmayne and Arundell became register 12 part 2. Aside from the losses, Bothe's register is in good condition. It has not been affected by damp like Neville's. But even if it were complete it would still lack a good deal of the material that we would expect to find in a later medieval episcopal register because of the scribal practices adopted under Neville which continued under Bothe and subsequent bishops. There is no common register to speak of and the many licences, mandates and letters that Bothe and his deputies must surely have issued have gone unrecorded.

George Oliver, who consulted Bothe's register in the middle of the nineteenth century when writing his *Lives of the Bishops of Exeter*, noted that 'no little perplexity is occasioned to [the register's] peruser by the transposition of the folios

through the ignorance of the binder'.¹⁰³ This is a reference to the final 15 or so folios of the institutions section which were bound up out of order when Bothe's register and those of his immediate successors were made into a single volume probably during the sixteenth century. The foliator failed to notice the problem and so his numbering is incorrect. The rebinding of the 1920s put things right and this explains the order of the folios at this point in my calendar.

Bothe's register does not have a folio 49. It was probably the final folio of the institutions section and presumably was a blank. Unlike the other losses it must have been removed after the book was foliated but before the 1641 inventory was compiled because the latter notes that Bothe, Courtenay, Fox and King's composite volume has 172 rather than 173 folios. 105

There are catchwords at the bottom of the versos of folios 27, 28 and 33.¹⁰⁶ These may well indicate the ending of quires but it is also possible that they were added by the scribes to guide users of a volume that was already in a disorganised state.¹⁰⁷ In any event there are no quire numbers on the rectos of folios 28, 29 and 34 nor indeed anywhere else in the register. It is therefore impossible to provide an analysis of the book's construction as was attempted for Neville's register.

There are three extraneous documents bound into Bothe's register. Presumably they were originally kept loose in the volume. The first, which occurs between folios 39 and 40, is a small paper insert measuring about a third of the size of a normal folio. It is in a late sixteenth or early seventeenth century hand and reads as follows:

Woolton died in March 1594 and so the document dates from after this event. Very likely the scribe was Robert Michell senior who was bishop's registrar from about 1595 until his death in 1624. 109 Quite possibly he was also the man responsible for creating the composite volume of which Bothe's register is part and for foliating it.

The other two documents are bound in between folios 44 and 45. They are large parchment inserts¹¹⁰ relating to the great tithes of Probus rectory which had been appropriated to the treasurership of Exeter Cathedral earlier in the middle ages. The first, dated 22 Oct 1429, is an official copy (or exemplification) of four letters from Bishops Brewer, Bronescombe and Quinil and the Exeter dean and chapter establishing the appropriation. The copy is authenticated by James Carslegh official principal of the Exeter consistory court, who did so at the request of Michael Lercedekne, treasurer from 1418 to 1442.111

Lercedekne wanted an official copy because there were no other copies of the letters in existence. If he were absent from the diocese he would not otherwise be able to prove his entitlement to the tithes. Exemplifications were commonly made in these circumstances. Witnesses to Carslegh's authentication are Roger Bolter cathedral precentor¹¹², Walter Colles prebendary of Exeter¹¹³, Roger Toker BCL advocate of the consistory court¹¹⁴, John Polyng BCL registrar of the consistory¹¹⁵ and Benedict Drew notary public. 116 Another notary, Robert Stephyns attests the exemplificiation. 117

The second insert is endorsed 'Division of the corn tithes of Probus between the treasurer and the prebends of Probus' and sets out in tabular form the lands belonging to the treasurer and prebends and the shares of the tithes arising from those lands. Probus was formerly a collegiate church consisting of a dean and five prebendaries. Bishop Brewer abolished the college in 1242 in order to augment the income of the cathedral treasurership merging the office of dean with that of the

treasurer. The prebends continued in existence and in 1312 a vicarage was ordained. The insert shows that some of the tithes belonged entirely to the treasurer whilst others were shared with the prebendaries who are named as Ralph Drewe¹¹⁸, William Elme, John Treloff, John Hancok¹¹⁹ and Walter Bayly. This document is undated but is evidently later than the first as Bayly was collated to his prebend in 1441, Drewe in 1444 and Treloff and Hancok in 1446.¹²⁰

None of the three sections of Bothe's register – institutions, wills and inquisitions – has been formally closed by the bishop's registrar¹²¹ and this is perhaps a further indication of the generally neglected state of the book.

(a) Institutions

This section occupies most of Bothe's surviving register. It records 449 admissions to livings. The involvement of Bothe is the outstanding feature of the sub-register. He made 220 admissions whilst the omnipresent Webber admitted 208 men and his successors as vicar-general, Lloyd and Gosse, 21. The chronology of the sub-register is good for most of the time. Only the final 30 or so entries are out of order. They are the institutions that Webber made in the last two years of his life and are added as an addendum.¹²²

Table 3 analyses the admissions by year and cause. Twenty one of the resignations are exchanges within Exeter diocese or between Exeter and other sees. Religious houses and collegiate churches made 106 presentations, the Exeter dean and chapter 29, the king seven and others – local and national laity – 225. These statistics are broadly similar to those for Neville. The difference lies in Bothe's own contribution. Not only did he make almost half the admissions but he also used his own patronage to good effect especially among the senior clergy of the diocese. Eighty six of Bothe's admissions were collations which mostly involved prebends. The majority occurred in the bishop's final 12 months. They were part of the 125 admissions made during Bothe's episcopate which involved graduates or those who claimed to be so. Again, the bishop was responsible for appointing the majority of them.

I suggested earlier that the sharp drop in admissions that occurred during the years 1469-71 may have been caused by political uncertainty. However, it is possible that under-registration may also have played its part. We know of at least four admissions made following inquisitions into vacancies in 1470 that were not entered into the institutions register. But under-registration frequently occurs in the registers of the later medieval bishops of Exeter and, as we saw earlier 127, nine of the 11 cathedral prebendaries that were appointed in the early years of Bothe's episcopate are also missing from the records. Admissions made away from Exeter needed to be reported to the registry. Pieces of parchment or paper could easily be lost or overlooked.

(b) Wills

Bothe's will register is a brief affair probably for the reasons suggested in my introduction to Neville's register. Only three wills all belonging to senior clergy are recorded. I have added Henry Webber's will because it seemed appropriate to do so given Webber's prominence in the affairs of the cathedral for so many years. The will survives among the chapter archives. It is likely that Archbishop Bourgchier intended to claim it for his prerogative court but it was never copied into the registers of that tribunal and so is not otherwise accessible.

All four wills follow the pattern set by their predecessors in earlier registers. Bequests are made to senior and junior colleagues, the poor, religious houses, relatives and servants. Webber's will is rather modest given the testator's standing

as dean of Exeter. His friendship with William Elyot and John Symon stands out whilst there is further evidence of the circulating library which operated among the clergy of the cathedral close. The will was made in 1472 with a codicil added a year later. This suggests that Webber's health in his final years may not have been good and that he took the sensible precaution of setting his affairs in order at an early date.

(c) <u>Inquisitions</u>

The decline in the quality of Bothe's register becomes especially apparent in this section which also includes a number of items appropriate to a common register. As we noted earlier, at least seven folios are missing¹²⁹ whilst several of the marginal headings used to describe the entries have been added in a later hand.

Inquisitions are recorded for only five of the 13 years of Bothe's episcopate and almost half occur in the first two years of his rule. This is unlikely to be attributable to the loss of folios because there are no losses between the last entry for 1466 and the first for 1470. The other years for which we have inquisitions are 1472 and 1473. This suggests that the sub-register only contains those inquiries that took place under Webber as vicar-general. When Bothe was in the diocese Webber's authority ceased and the recording of inquisitions also stopped. Redundant folios at the end of the sub-register were used to record a few select examples of Bothe's pastoral and administrative work in the diocese. These largely belong to the years 1468 and 1469 when the bishop first arrived in the south-west.

Trusty and well-beloved we greet you well, letting you know 135 how by the report of our trusty and right well-beloved counsellor Master Piers Courtenay we to our good pleasure have understanding that you of late upon perfect¹³⁶ knowledge by you had of the grievous infirmities that rest upon the person of the reverend father in God the bishop of Exeter where through as well his health as his natural discretion been greatly abated and diminished have caused amongst you certain good directions as well for the contentation of his debts as for the guiding of his household during the season and time of his said infirmities for the which we thank you in our hearty wise and pray you by your wisdoms and said discretions to ordain amongst you that all such livelihoods as appertain unto the said reverend father may be guided and bestowed in such good and politique wise for the contentation of his said debts at the church of Exeter aforesaid hereafter by reason of the same shall not need to be charged or in any wise hindered and also that you diminish his household by avoiding of such persons as you think not needful nor profitable unto him. Provided¹³⁷ always that Master John Stubbes and Master Robert Barfoot continue about him as head officers of his said household as they have heretofore. And that you fail not to accomplish this our pleasure as our very trust is in you and as we therefore may have cause to give you our special thanks. Given under our signet at our castle of Windsor the 13th day of April.

Bothe has commissioned Webber to resolve a dispute between the parishioners of Harberton and the inhabitants of Halwell. The commission relates that more than a century earlier there had been dissentions and discord about the payments that the inhabitants of Halwell made to their mother church for the upkeep of religious books, ornaments, lights and bells. The matter was heard by Bishop Grandisson's official principal in St Mary Major church Exeter on 22 Nov 1340. M Richard Todeworthy clerk represented the parishioners of Harberton and M Edward Bony clerk¹⁴⁹⁶ the inhabitants of Halwell. The court decided that the inhabitants of Halwell should contribute towards the books, ornaments and bells but not the lights. Now Webber, who has been assisted in his deliberations by Robert Barforth precentor of Crediton College¹⁴⁹⁷, has to adjudicate upon the inhabitants of Halwell's wish that they be allowed to receive sacraments in their chapel and that

burials be freely made in their cemetery because of the distance of the chapel from the mother church. On 7 May in Exeter Cathedral Webber formally adjudicates that the cemetery attaching to Halwell chapel is to be consecrated with the consent of the Exeter Dean & Chapter and William Hillyng the vicar of Harberton. Vicars of Harberton are henceforth to provide at their own cost a chaplain to perform divine service and free burials at Halwell. The chaplain is to reside in the dwelling called the priest's house with two gardens and a rood of land attached. The vicars of Harberton are to pay 6s 8d rent for the house to the inhabitants of Halwell. In return the inhabitants are to pay the vicars of Harberton 26s 8d annually for the maintenance of the chapel and the priest's house. They are also to continue to pay their dues including the tithes on the gardens of the priest's house to their mother church with the exception of the lights. They are to allow vicars of Harberton to dispose of the trees growing in their cemetery and they are to pay the expenses of the chaplain and the holy water clerk serving the chapel. Robert Smale chaplain 1499 and Alan Sares are the proctors appearing before Webber on behalf of the parishioners of Harberton and the inhabitants of Halwell. 1500

¹⁵⁵⁸ Barnecote had earlier been involved in a dispute with Lady Margaret Hungerford about the living of Minster. He claimed that Minster was appropriated to Tywardreath Priory and made a tuitorial appeal to the archbishop's court of Arches in 1468 following Richard Olyver's admission to the rectory on Lady Margaret's presentation (see 106 and CRO, ART/6/3). Barnecote also disputed the Hungerford family's right to the lands mentioned in the five charters which had been granted to Minster Priory in the twelfth and thirteenth centuries but which the family had taken back into their control after the death of the last prior in 1408 (CRO, ART/6/4). The account in Orme, *VCH*, pp. 243-44 is not entirely correct: Bishop Bothe was not a supporter of Barnecote but a co-defendant with Lady Margaret and Olyver in the tuitorial appeal. (A tuitorial appeal was an appeal made to the archbishop's court to protect the appellant's interests in a dispute).
